Galway attack fails to fire in final

Gallant effort by Tribeswomen undermined by forward struggles against Corkery inspired Cork

IN the end, that eighth and final step proved the longest stride of all - as Galway's bid to land a second All-Ireland senior camogie title fell just short against a Cork outfit still hurting from the pain of decider defeat 12 months previously.

Having negotiated almost every other obstacle in senior camogie this year - and successfully mastered the seven steps on route to the 2008 All-Ireland final - Galway discovered that when it comes to taking that eighth step you need pretty big boots.

When they finally pluck up the courage to look back at this fiercely competitive decider - played in front of a modest Croke Park attendance of 18,727 last Sunday the Galway ladies will realise the outcome of this game could have been so different.

For how many times have we seen it, that old adage of goals win matches? And that's what this contest really came down to at the final whistle. Simply. Cork made the most of their chances, while Galway both spurned and were denied gilt-edged opportunities at the other end, particularly in the second period.

The first of a trio of chances arrived on 36 minutes when a Jessica Gill sideline cut was fielded brilliantly by her Athenry team-mate Therese Maher whole, with not one Galway in the Cork penalty area. Within moments, Maher was on the deck and referee Eamon day. Browne had his arms outstretched for a penalty.

On most days, Gill would have blasted the effort to the back of the Cork net and Tribeswomen began well, with

beyond. However, in keeper Aoife Murray, Gill found an equal, with the Cork custodian repelling the dead ball strike to keep her side's 2-5 to 1-6 advantage intact.

By the 56th minute, Cork had nudged a little further ahead, 2-9 to 1-8, but Galway could and should have cut this four-point lead to a single point when wing-back Niamh Kilkenny, now operating at midfield, cut like a scissors through fine silk and dissected the Leesiders rearguard.

A deft touch inside found Veronica Curtin in front of the posts, but at the last second the ball spilled from her grasp and the opportunity was lost to her - but not to Galway. In the ensuing play, Gill was onto the breaking ball, however she was unable to guide her subsequent effort between the posts - her blistering shot tearing up the side netting.

While Cork sharpshooter Rachel Moloney converted a free on the stroke of full-time to put the victors into a 2-10 to 1-8 lead, Galway still didn't lose heart. Two minutes into the four of injury-time, substitutes Catriona Cormican and Deirdre Burke combined, with Burke's strike looking net

Again, though, Murray was equal to the task with the Cork 'keeper pulling out a top-drawer save to deny the St. Thomas'

Three gilt-edged opportunities and no score to show for it. In many respects, this was the tale of woe of the Tribeswomen's attack on a forward raising a flag of any description from play on the

In contrast, the Cork offensive unit made the most of their opportunities, especially in the first half. Although the

Gill converting four placed balls in the opening nine minutes. Cork had secured a 1-3 to 0-4 lead by the 19th minute. The Leesiders' opening goal arrived midway through the half, when Sile Burns raced onto a breaking ball and placed her shot superbly beyond Galway goalkeeper Susan Earner.

Within five minutes, hero Burns pounced for her second after the Galway defence which otherwise had a very solid afternoon - failed to clear their lines. The wily corner forward made no mistake in bringing her championship

No doubt, these two goals ultimately proved the difference, although credit to the Galway girls for bouncing right back into contention before the half-time break. Trailing 2-3 to 0-5, the Tribeswomen certainly needed something to haul themselves back into the contest.

They got the break they so badly yearned for four minutes before the interval when a speculative long range shot from midfielder Aine Hillary eluded 'keeper Murray and dropped to the back of the Cork net. This left just the min-

imum between the two finalists at the break - 1-5 to 2-3 and Galway were still very much in the hunt for their first All-Ireland senior title since

In truth, this scoreline reflected the nature of the first half. For the most part, Galway had kept the exchanges tight, with the likes of Ailbhe Kelly, Ann Marie Hayes, Sinead Cahalan and Kilkenny handling a great deal of ball in this period. Sandra Tannion and Therese Manton were also toiling diligently in the corner

back positions. Indeed, despite the conces-

sion of two goals, both goalkeeper and defence acquitted themselves well against a Cork outfit that had players who have this amazing gift of appearing out of nowhere to get a hook, block or score.

This was underlined in the opening volley of the second half when midfielder Orla Cotter popped up to add a long range point to a Moloney 32nd minute free to put Cork 2-5 to 1-5 ahead.

Gill responded with a free, following a foul on Kilkenny, but then was unable to convert that 36th minute penalty which would have secured the

Tribeswomen the lead.

In the ensuing 10 minutes or so. Gill then traded scores with Moloney to leave the Westerners chasing a 1-8 to 2-8 deficit. That said, the Munster outfit's lead could have been greater had Earner not pulled off quality saves from the raiding Amanda O'Regan on 49 minutes and Una O'Donoghue on 52 minutes.

As it was, Cork - inspired by Murray, Gemma O'Connor and Player of the Match Briege Corkery - did add two points to their tally through Moloney, while Galway failed to register any further score in the final quarter.

It was a disappointing end to a Galway campaign that reached so many highs along the way. Indeed, the progress Galway has made under the management team of Liam Donoghue, Damien Coleman and Anne Broderick this year has been significant and should not be blemished by this All-Ireland defeat.

For in the space of 12 months. Galway have gone from perennial challengers to genuine championship contenders and if this squad can show the same level of improvement next season, then, the O'Duffy Cup, tied up brightly in maroon and white ribbons, will finally cross the Shannon for only the second time in the Association's histo-

Certainly, the management team of Donoghue, Coleman and Broderick left no stone unturned in their preparation, while the commitment and dedication of the 25 players in returning Galway camogie to the hallowed ground of Croke Park was second to none.

All involved will also have learned a great deal from last weekend's experience. Cork have lived in Croke Park on the second Sunday of Septem-

ber for the past decade or so and this was reflected in the manner in which their more campaigners seasoned responded to the big occasion.

Remember, these were also proud players left scarred by the 2007 All-Ireland final defeat to Wexford. There was never likely to be any complacency on their part heading into this contest - particularly given Galway had already defeated them in the round robin section of the champi-

These vital attributes, namely experience and hurt, Galway can now bring to the table next year. It will still take a massive effort, but with a settled squad and the right motivation they can return and go one better.

Of course, by reaching the All-Ireland final, Galway have not only raised the profile of camogie within the county but also restored a great deal of pride in the jersey. That alone should entice a number of able players from around the county back into the Galway set-up come January.

For now is the time to drive on. This is not simply the end, but only the end of the beginning. There are happier and greater days ahead for this ever improving and youthful Galway side. And a lot more steps

Galway camp dejected over loss to Cork

Team captain Cahalan and coach Coleman insist they will be back despite post All-Ireland gloom

THEY did their county proud, yet Galway's senior camogie players couldn't help but feel they had let the jersey down. That was the measure of belief the Tribeswomen had heading into their All-Ireland showdown with Cork. They never entertained the notion that they might lose.

Galway captain Sinead Cahalan had, understandably, a despondent look on her face. She, along with her team-mates, had given it their all, and still came up short. The post mortem began.

"I can't believe we are in this position. We never considered losing all year and it is just heartbreaking to be where we are now," said Cahalan. "I suppose, you have to take the positives out of it. We have gone a step closer than we have before and the average age of the team is quite young.

So that is on our side as well. Please God our day will come yet." For many, Galway's championship race seemed to have been run heading into injurytime. Cork, inspired by goalkeeper Aoife Murray, wingback Gemma O'Connor and midfielder stroke sweeper Briege Corkery, had closed up shop. Yet, Cahalan never lost hope.

"Even down to the last minute, I was just thinking we are still going to win, we are going to get a goal from somewhere. We still thought we would get a goal like we did in the semi-final. It just didn't happen on the day and we didn't get the lucky break. It is pure heartbreak," continued the 22-year-old Mullagh player.

"I suppose, we have had our ups and downs the last few years. This year we met on the fourth of January and put in 91 training sessions this year altogether. That doesn't count all the work we put in on our own.

"It is unreal. It just shows what it takes to win it - it takes everything - and still when you give it everything you still have to come out feeling like this. People are telling us we have to lose one to win one. I suppose so. I think we are definitely a step closer to achieving our goal."

Indeed, that has to be the greatest positive of all. Galway now know what it takes to get to Croke Park and, to be honest, this side was not all that far away from the winning post last Sunday.

"It was brilliant to play on the big day," said Cahalan. "I would give anything to play again on the big day in Croke Park - to get to another All-

Ireland final. So would all the rest of the girls. "There are some unbeliev-

"There are some unbelievable players on this team and some may feel they did not play to their full potential, even though everyone gave a good display. Some of them do feel like that, however, and they will want to right that again next year. They want to get it right for next year."

Coach Damien Coleman expressed similar sentiments, noting the management and players did believe they left the game behind them to a certain extent. "There are no blame games, though. Those

players are serious girls and they gave us a massive commitment all year.

"The whole county got behind them and they have given the clubs and the County Board something that hasn't happened in our county for so long. So they deserve every credit for their efforts. Maybe, sometimes you have to feel these feelings before you come out the right side. So this will harden our group of players. They are a young panel, they are very self motivated and they will be back.

"It didn't happen for some of our players out there today and, naturally, they are going to be very disappointed. Nobody, though, goes out in an All-Ireland final to underperform. So we will stick together. It is easy to stick together in victory but it is a real test of character to stick together in defeat. This will define this team," believed Coleman, who also wished to pay tribute to the County Board and the clubs for their support.

Meanwhile, Cork captain Catriona Foley said her side had paid heed to the lessons they had learned in their All-Ireland final defeat to Wexford last year, insisting that the pain and hurt of that loss was the primary motivation behind their successful bid for a 23rd O'Duffy Cup title on Sunday

"We all knew what had to be done," beamed Foley. "We were in the same situation last year. We were up against an inexperienced team in that it was Wexford's first time in Croke Park and it was the same with Galway this year.

"Also, Galway had beaten us earlier in the championship as well, with a late goal in that one, and that wasn't going to happen today. We made sure of it," insisted Foley.

Indeed, the Rockban full-

back said they felt nothing but relief at the final whistle, Foley highlighting that with players of the calibre of Veronica Curtin, Therese Maher and Jessica Gill – who finished the championship with an impressive total of 6-48 – the Cork defence could not afford to relax at any time.

"It was so tense there for the last 10 minutes. Then, when you have four minutes of injury-time left, with the likes of Jessica Gill and Veronica Curtin inside, you can't take your eye off the ball for a second.

"Jessica has been a very good asset to Galway all year, but she didn't score from play today. I think that is credit to the awesome defence of the Cork backline," stressed the Rebel.

Cork manager Denise
Cronin also paid tribute to the
defence, and particularly goalkeeper Aoife Murray. She
exclaimed: "Aoife Murray was
outstanding. She had put her
hand up in the dressing-room
at half-time and was very disappointed with the (Galway)
goal that went in.

"We know she is one of the best players in the country; she is one of the best keepers around. I think she proved that out there. She brought off three point blank saves. You might talk about a lot of people, but the only reason we are celebrating today is because of Aoife Murray.

"Galway, though, were always going to be very tough. We played them earlier on in the year and they have some exceptional players. You could see that out there today. They have great team play and a great team plan. I suppose, once Cork got into the swing of things, we took over and got two goals very quickly, which knocked them back on their feet," concluded the Cork manager.

Lack of cutting edge proves Galway's downfall as noble showing goes unrewarded

MIDWAY through the opening-half of Sunday's All-Ireland senior camogie final, Galway were four points to one ahead, enjoying the lion's share of possession and carrying the battle to Cork, but already you could sense that they wouldn't be quite good enough in the end.

Apart from Cork gradually finding their stride, it was Galway's utter inability to make their territorial advantage count which was most alarming. Four points from Jessica Gill's placed balls were poor reward for their dominance and ambition . . . and it would come back to haunt them.

The Galway attack failed to make any real headway and their failure to land a solitary score from play was nothing short of disastrous. It was bad enough that such key forwards as Veronica Curtin, Therese Maher and Gill – apart from her wonderful accuracy from frees - were below form, but three clearcut goal chances in the second-half weren't availed of either.

Of course, the tenacity, tackling and covering of the Cork rearguard was exceptional with wing back Gemma O'Connor leading their resistance, but Galway for all their industry and commitment just didn't possess the necessary cutting edge and penetration up front.

Two opportunist goals from Sile Burns not alone wiped out Galway's early advantage, but powered Cork into a four point lead by the 20th minute. That must have been a devastating turn of events for the Tribeswomen, especially as their half-back line of Ann Marie Hayes, Sinead Calahan and Niamh Kilkenny had started the match with real conviction.

In fact, only for a somewhat

fortunate goal from Aine Hillary in the 26th minute, Galway would have been in dire trouble, but that score kept the destination of the O'Duffy Cup up for grabs and also gave them a platform from which to build on the

Cork, however, were now forcing the pace. Briege Corkery was a real dynamo around midfield, but they had an escape in the 36th minute when Gill's well struck penalty effort was expertly parried by their fearless goalkeeper, Aoife Murray.

The Athenry teenager had a second goal chance when the ball fell to her after Curtin took her eye of a perceptive Niamh Kilkenny pass, but Gill blazed her effort wide of the near post in the 56th minute at a stage when Cork had forged 2-9 to 1-8 ahead.

Basically, that was game over for Galway, but they admirably, but they kept driving forward and only a breathtaking reflex save from Murray denied substitute Deirdre Burke a consolation goal in injury time. Five points they fell short at the finish, but Galway can be proud of a noble effort.

effort.

Obviously, a number of players will be disappointed that they didn't exert a bigger impact on the game, but that may have something to do with the quality of opposition. Niamh Kilkenny was probably their top performer, but goal-keeper Susan Earner and Therese Manton were both excellent too.

Galway camogie has come a long way in the past few months and at both senior and intermediate level, their teams weren't far away from ultimate honours. Naturally, the final part of the journey and capturing silverware remains the most difficult but, at least, the organisation, pride and spirit is back at local level.



Their senior team were crowned national league champions, but the disappointment at their failure to make it to the senior semi-finals was huge.

They will be determined to stop Cork bid for the double, but given the form to date from both sides Cork will go in as favourites.

They will need to stamp their authority on the game from the throw-in and set the pace from the start and not allow Kilkenny time to settle if they can do this victory is well within their reach.

"I would have to say that it would go back to when the girls, Amanda and Louise, were playing in Sciath Na Scoil. Christine went down and started to give a hand with the school. They started to do well and it gave us our bedrock. The kids developed an interest. That for me was the big turning point."

Good players now keep on coming though the underage system for Douglas, meaning there is always a healthy competition for places.



DOUGLAS are Cork county senior camogie champions for the first time after seeing off St Finbarr's in a crack-ing game last evening in Páire Ui

This predominantly young, but star-studded side, sunk the champions of 2006 who had high hopes of regain-ing the trophy. Too many are doing too little



THERE is often much criticism directed at camogie.

So many crib about the lack of PR work done at national level. Those who are complaining don't realise the work that is being undertaken.

PR isn't just about having match previews and reports in every national and local news-

A huge part of PR/marketing is about developing the brand.

There is a huge amount being done at national level and great strides are being made. But they won't achieve success overnight and that's why perseverance is crucial.

I'm quite sure those making such a huge effort become dismayed and disheartened with all the negativity.

Five years ago I'd have agreed with most, that we had a long way to go. But with the appointment of personnel such as the regional development officers and director of development there is an acknowledgment and steady progression towards nurturing the game in non playing counties and strengthening it in oth-

Our relationship with the Irish Sports Council has flourished, lending to the availability of further grants, which is put back into the game. Would the Sports Council offer such assistance if they didn't feel their funds were being put to good use?

The attendance at this year's camogie final was disappointing, in and around 18,000.

Considering that six teams took to the field that day it was extremely poor. The Tipperary v Kilkenny U21 hurling final drew a small crowd and it was envisaged that the staging of

this final on All-Ireland camogie day would enhance the crowd needed to make 'hiring out' Croke Park viable.

Not so! I would have expected a great turn-out from Kilkenny as they sought their third All-Ireland title of 2008.

Wexford brought an incredible crowd to Croke Park last year when the attendance was over 30,000. I was hoping in some part that they would reach it again because they always bring a large vocal support.

Maybe that's down to lack of success. If Wexford were in All-Ireland finals year after year would the support hold?

It may seem that Irish

people don't travel to GAA in the development of camomatches as much as they used to. I don't feel that is the case. I think there are just too many matches now and to get to them all, particularly with a family, is impossible. So people pick and choose.

Despite the best efforts of the association to hold a National Club Forum today in Croke Park, the event had to be cancelled due to a lack of take up from clubs across the country. There are over 540 camogie clubs in Ireland and throughout Britain, Europe, US, Australia and Dubai.

Among others, the National Forum was to provide the opportunity to give clubs a voice

gie, recognise the role of camogie in building local communities, identify emerging issues for the development of the game, hear about new initiatives to promote camogie.

There were a lot of activities planned as well as a tour of Croke Park Stadium and camogie promotional material.

Unfortunately those involved in club camogie are already doing more than their fair share, so a trip to Croke Park is possibly viewed as an additional burden rather than a nice day out.

Too few are getting involved don't have an 8-4.30pm or sim-

ilar working life, getting to the ground in time for early evening training sessions or matches, particularly away games, is difficult.

A burden shared is a burden halved, but it is amazing how the same people are doing it all year after year.

I do believe that if you ask many to do a little it will succeed rather than asking a few to do a lot.

The National Forum is re-scheduled for February. Maybe it will have a greater chance of success at the beginning of a season when volunteers are fresh and eager in underage, but for many who rather than the end when they are tired and need a break.

When did you start playing camogie? When I went into first year in St Patrick's College. I had never heard of camogie before then. I was soccer crazy. So I

suppose I must have been 12 or 13 years old. I remember principal John Ring coming into the class and asking us if we would play. I put my hand up and went home and told my parents I was going to play hockey with St Patrick's. My dad said: Are you sure it's not camogie? I'm sure that's what they play in St Patrick's' Of course, he

was right.

What are your proudest memories? I
was extremely proud to be made captain
of the school team in sixth-year.

Obviously, captaining Cork was a proud

moment too.

But some of my greatest memories are of specific matches. I would place

winning the All-Ireland title in 1995 against Kilkenny in the dying moments, at the top of the list. But no matter what jersey it was, I felt tremendous pride. I always went out every time to do it justice. I might not have always achieved this, but I tried.

Have you any advice for young players?

I would encourage all youngsters to play sports. It doesn't have to be camogie, but I would be pushing that it is. It's healthy and enjoyable but, most of all, it develops you as an individual. Both physically and emotionally, one develops through sport. Learn to listen and take advice, improve on your weaknesses and play to your strengths, display a

commitment to your teammates, learn to take the highs with the lows, and adapt to whatever is needed for the team.

All these characteristics you will need in life. Whether it's on the pitch in school, in the workplace or at home, you will need to call upon these traits in your personality at some stage.





St. Finbarr's Camogie Club

The present St. Finbarr's Camogie Club was formed in 1972 under the guidance of Frances Barry-Murphy. Our first championship success came in 1981 when Marie O'Sullivan captained her team to victory in the Cork Junior Championship. The Club climbed another step up the ladder in the following year when Louise Cosgrove led the Barrs to glory in the Intermediate Championship.

Ellen Clifford was skipper when the Barrs captured the Cork Senior B title in 2001. Today, the Barrs hope to add another chapter to their history. Fresh from their All Ireland success, Gemma O'Connor, Lynda O'Connell and Jenny Duffy, will lead the charge. The panel has prepared well under the direction of Derek McCarthy and will give of their best to bring the coveted trophy back to Neenan Park.

They went into that game under the shadow of a defeat by the Western County earlier in the group series of games in the championship. Early in the decider it looked as if that win over the Leesiders had given a good all round Galway side a real boost in confidence as they took the game in splendid fashion to their opponents.

It took the more experience Cork outfit ten minutes to open their scoring. By then Galway had rifled over four points and were playing with poise and plenty of skill.

The Southerners came more into the game after that and right full forward Sile Burns stepped into the picture in a big way.

The Rockban club player hit the first goal of the game after seventeen minutes and three minutes later was back again to find her way through to the Western net.

However, Galway, to their credit, did not flinch and coming up to the interval they received a real boost when a long range shot from midfielder Aine Hillary ended up in the Cork net.

That score left the Westerners well in the hunt at the interval when they trailed by just a point—2-3 to 1-5.



Galway continued to strive valiantly in the second half but found Aoife Murray in tremendous form in the Leeside goal. She brought off three magnificent saves during the half.

Cork, powered by the tireless and accomplished Briege Corkery, continued to play with purpose and flair in the second half and eventually finished deserving winners by 2-10 to 1-8 to complete a splendid come-back from that defeat by Wexford in last year's showpiece game.

Cork were particularly well represented in the middle of the park where Corkery and Orla Cotter did much with their tireless play and skills to orchestrate the success.

Rachel Moloney was another ace in the Leeside pack, finishing their leading scores with seven points, four from frees, and two from 45's.

Cathriona Foley played a real captain's role with her leadership and reliable hurling at full back, while left half back Sara Hayes was another stalwart in a disciplined rearguard that gave little away easily.

Over-all it was a good team performance by Cork. However, credit must also go to a gallant Galway side, which contributed in rich measure to one of the best finals in years.





Came the '08 campaign and having been deprived of a three-in-a-row achievement Cork set out to start another bid for that marvellous exploit, one that had visited them in 1934-37, '39-'41, and '70-'72 to which was added '73 for good measure. New team management, the need to introduce some new players because of retirements, leaves of absence etc presented Cork with a huge challenge

and how they rose to it. Wexford were handed a ten point threshing in the round robin series but Galway stepped in to inflict the only defeat in the campaign. Unexpected, to say the least, especially on their home patch. When Tipperary fell in the semi final and champions Wexford bowed out to Galway's blistering finish, the scene was set for an opportunity to set the record straight.

Galway were back in the final for the first time since 1998 when they suffered defeat to Cork in the first ever live televised final. Two years earlier they had won their one and only title, beating Cork. So, back in Croke Park after such a lengthy absence, it had to be Cork again. A serious mission for both. Revenge for '07 and for that round robin defeat by Galway firmly

in Cork's minds: Galway so anxious to add to that solitary title victory of '96.

Cork's day it was and deservedly so. So able in all departments, oozing confidence and far sharper in attack, they clipped Galway's wings thus making Sunday September 14th a truly red-letter day for the Rebel County. Their 2-10 to 1-8 victory brought them their 23rd title, thus leaving them but three behind Dublin's proud tally of twenty-six in camogie's roll of honour.

It was a good championship, with Cork always setting the pace. Five of the seven teams were there with a shout of making it to the semis. Dublin and Limerick seen as having some way yet to go before breaking though. The first shock came in the opening series when newly crowned league champions Kilkenny fell to Tipperary in Nowlan Park but Tipp's hopes were rudely dashed when facing up to Cork down in Ballincollig. There, they lost a four point interval lead to succumb to a nine point defeat. But the main talking point in the early rounds was the failure of Wexford to capitalise on their '07 success. Did they celebrate too well or had the appetite left them? Following defeats to Cork and Galway they pulled themselves together, beat Kilkenny and Dublin and edged out Tipp with a late goal in Semple Stadium before ensuring their renaissance with a big victory over Limerick. Kilkenny's first series defeat by Tipp, coming so soon after their league final victory over Galway seemed to set them back quite a bit and they found themselves struggling thereafter. eventually losing out on a last four place.

Nevertheless, they are hardly too worried about the future in Kilkenny. Their under 16 side claimed national honours for the fourth successive year. Cork their victims for the third time running. All-Ireland minor honours were also theirs and their Intermediates have a final date with Cork. Like their male counterparts, there's a steady stream of talent on the verge of development and sure to cause problems for all others quite soon.


When the disappointment of this year's final defeat subsides Galway will be there again next season, more determined still. Tipp are somewhat in transition but it has to be a worry for the Premier County that the talent pool is not as productive as might be expected in the light of what was achieved in 1999-2004. Wexford need only to get into the mood. They have the players. Dublin and Limerick are indeed finding the going tough at the top. For all that, they are fiercely determined and perseverance can pay off eventually. But of course, it will be Cork they all have to

Liz – tailor made for camogie's top job

O'Callaghan had opened the gates to progress and a sense of adventure during her three years in office. Liz was all for progress. for heightening camogie's image.

t took Tipperary until 1999 to win the All Ireland senior camogic title for the first time. It was a further seven years before a native of the county acquired the reins of leadership of the Camogie Association. Saturday March 25th 2006 saw that achievement come about in the Tullamore Court Hotel. Appropriate it was that the woman chosen to lead the Association for a three year period should be one who is steeped in GAA tradition and who over several years has become one of the most voluble and easily recognisable female faces in a predominantly male domain.

LIZ HOWARD is indeed better known for her GAA rather than her camogie involvement, in spite of the fact that she did line out for Tipperary and had the distinction of being on the Tipp team that won the inaugural National League title back in 1977. She also played for Dublin and was instrumental in the revival of the game in Clare.

However, her personnel work with Aer Lingus provided her with the ideal backdrop against which to apply her excellent communications skills, skills that worked a treat during a long involvement with the Tipperary County GAA Board as its PRO. Those skills were also extended to a broader scene when she was an analyst on the inaugural 'Sunday Game' television programme with presenter Jim Carney.

So, how come the move to camogie at administrative level and the somewhat rapid rise to the office of National President?

Liz readily attributes her promotion from the peripheral side of camogie to the inner sanctum, to the influence of the woman she succeeded in 2006. Mirjam

O'Callaghan. Miriam and Liz met for the first time on the 'Forum for Women in Gaelic Games' group, a body set up in 2000 and which Liz chaired. Miriam invited Liz on to camogie's Management Committee, a timely invitation indeed because of the lead-in to the Camogie Association's centenary celebrations in 2004.

Certainly a case of being thrown in at the deep end, but nothing could have pleased the Youghalarra woman more because of her penchant for hard work and for getting stuck in, as was indeed the case when it came to the centenary celebrations. Liz left her mark quite emphatically in the organisation of much of what went on during centenary year, notably the celebration banquets and the arrangements for All Ireland final day itself.

CCIA (Third Level Colleges) nominated Liz for the presidency of the Camogie

Association and she entered the race at the 2006 Congress, facing into a contest with Pat Rafferty from Fermanagh, who had held the office immediately prior to Miriam O'Callaghan.

For one who invariably sets high standards in everything she seeks to accomplish, this was one venture, about the outcome of which she had grave doubts. Apart from the fact that she was a relative newcomer to the camogie big time scene, she felt that the Association was only gradually awakening into the 21st century, having been mired in traditional values for so long.

Miriam O'Callaghan had opened the gates to progress and a sense of adventure during her three years in office. Liz was all for progress, for heightening camogie's image. Old ways were still highly valued among many of the rank and file members and Liz genuinely felt that she would have a really tough struggle on her hands if she was to emerge with the confidence of delegates in her favour.


To say she was surprised when Miriam O'Callaghan announced the result would be an understatement. The voting was not revealed but word was that the margin was decisive and it was an emotional Liz Howard who addressed the delegates but who immediately announced that although she would follow excellently drawn footprints to a degree she would also create her own. A clear indication, even at that early stage, that she would be her own person.

And that she has been throughout a busy and eventful reign which comes to an end next March when she will be succeeded by the Kildare-based Cork native Joan O'Flynn. Earlier. Liz had been one of those who had helped to draw up the Association's Strategic Plan, a document in which she firmly believes and which she sees as being the only way

forward for camogie. She will also admit to having stepped on toes in the way in which she has set up various subcommittees and in what she expected them to produce, along with her attitude to other organisational and administrative matters.

Unfortunately. Liz didn't have the opportunity while President of presenting the O'Duffy Cup to a Tipperary captain on All Ireland final day. That aside, her years in office have been hugely gratifying and without a doubt when she hands over to Joan O'Flynn in March Liz Howard will have the satisfaction of having led her organisation with incisiveness, imagination, dedication and courage.

Last April the honour her election as Camogie President brought to her native county was reflected in her being chosen as the Tipperary Person of the Year by the county Association in Dublin.



Mary Golden (O'Sullivan) 1908 - 2008

Mary Golden (O'Sullivan), who came from generations of Kilkenny forebears, was born in 1908 in Kilkenny city, where she lived her entire life until her death on 27th September, 2008.

Having been educated in the Presentation Convent primary and secondary schools. Mary

and secondary schools, Mary went on to become a primary teacher and taught in Muckalee, Revanagh, Danesfort, Sheestown and the John of God Convent.

Mary met her husband, Joe Golden, an Abbeyleix man, while she was in Muckalee and while he was teaching in Revanagh. They married on December 29, 1930, and had six children. Prior to having a car, they cycled daily from the city to Muckalee and Revanagh. Because of petrol rationing during the war years, they again resorted to the bicy-cles. Mary and Joe taught cles. Mary and Joe taught together for many years in Sheestown two-teacher school where Joe was principal, until the smaller country schools were amalgamated with Kilkenny city schools.

While in Sheestown, Mary and Joe were in school very early every morning to have the old, smoky, pot-bellied stoves lighted so that the school would be warm when the children arrived. Together they imparted to their pupils their great love of learning and created an environment in which the children were encouraged to reach their full potential.

For singing and music lessons, Mary cajoled a remarkably melodious tone from an ancient harmonium in the school. Both Mary and Joe were passionately interested in giving both the girls and the boys every opportu-nity to pursue further education. Many of their pupils won schol-

arships to secondary school. All of the children played hurling during the sos and lunch times and many of them later won All-Ireland camogie and hurling medals with Kilkenny.

Their past-pupils remember Mary and Joe for their excellent teaching abilities, their kindness, sense of humour and gen-

uine interest in them and in their

Mary continued to teach, as was permitted at the time of her retirement, until she reached 67 years of age and, even after that, was in demand as a substitute. Her love of children and her innate affinity with them was evident throughout her career

and in her relationship with her grandchildren and great-grand-children. On her instructions, her great-grandchildren add-ressed her as May. Both Mary and Joe were mem-

bers of Conradh na Gaeilge, of the I.N.T.O. and of the Retired

Teachers' Association.

In speaking about Mary during her funeral Mass in St.
Mary's Cathedral, Fr. Mark
Condon referred to the changes
that had taken place during her lifetime of over 100 years. He remarked that in 1908, when Mary was born, Kilkenny had only three All-Ireland Senior Hurling titles and that she had cheered the county on to anoth-

She had witnessed two world wars, troubled times and peace in her own country, and enormous technological advance. She had begun teaching 80 years previously and had experienced and managed radical changes in teaching methods and syllabii during a career which spanned

six decades Given her love of the Irish language and of traditional liturgi-cal music, Mary would have appreciated, during her Mass, the singing of Owen Gilhooley, the organ-playing of Ger Lawlor and the music arrangements by David Agler - each of whom is associated with the Wexford Opera Festival, as well as the ethereal quality and beauty of Virginia Kerr's singing on the

previous evening.

Last March Mary celebrated her 100th birthday in Archersrath Nursing Home in which, with the loving and kind care of Anna Maher and her staff, she found a home-from-home during her recent years.

She enjoyed the company of

the next three generations of her own family, her extended O'Sullivan and Golden family, her friends, neighbours, her next-door neighbour and friend of seventy years, Nancy Langton, past-pupils, former colleagues, former camogie players and hurlers, and those who enabled her to live in her own home for almost 98 years.

Fr. Ollie Maher presented her with a letter and cheque on behalf of Uachtarán na hÉireann, Máire Bean Mhic Giolla

Mary was delighted to also welcome on that occasion the Mayor of Kilkenny, Marie Fitzpatrick, the Ardstürthöir of Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael, Síle de Bhailís, and former Camogie Presidents and, during the following days, the President of the LN.T.O. and representatives of the Kilkenny branch of the Retired Teachers Association.

They, together with many more from all over Ireland, joined Mary's family in St. Mary's Cathedral to celebrate her long and productive life. Mary was pre-deceased by her husband Joe, her sons Frank and Paddy, her sons-in-law Naise Briscoe and Kevin O'Grady, and her great-grandson James Treacy.

A loving and generous mother, Mary is survived by Noreen (Briscoe), Marette (O'Grady), Jim and Jo, her daughter-in-law Betty, her eight grandchildren and her sixteen great-grandchil-dren in Ireland, England and Canada.

"After the camogie final we celebrated on the Monday and the Tuesday, but I was back training with the footballers on the Wednesday to prepare for the Monaghan game.





"I attended Scoil Chriost Ri in Turner's Cross in the middle to late 60s and came under the tuition of the late former Clare senior footballer, Br Fabian, who would have coached a host of players who would go on to represent Cork at minor and senior level.

"I believe the Cummins', Cogan bothers, Dinny Allen and many more benefitted from his coaching.

"He was a fabulous player and instilled in us the skills of the game, such as kicking left and right and of course fielding.

"From there I moved to Colaiste Mhuire, now Douglas Community School, playing alongside future Blackrock and Cork senior hurler Danny Buckley while playing club hurling and football with Douglas and Seandún.

"We both tried our hand at playing rugby for Sunday's Well, but I was fortunate to win an All-Ireland minor football medal in 1974 until a knee injury curtailed my career.

"I continued to play intermediate until the early 90s.

So where did camogie fit in to all this?

"My involvement with camogie

came completely by accident. "I was asked when I was a minor

player to help out in training.

"As far as I know, camogie was played in the early part of the century at the club.


"However, the game was only revived again in the early 70s thanks to the trojan efforts of Pauline Downey, Mary Dineen, Ann Drinan, Jim Daly (RIP) and Imelda Slav

"The club would have played in the main in the junior category until our breakthrough in winning the senior B league and championship last season with respective victories over Rockban and Valley Rovers.

Douglas' progress has been very gradual over the years.

It's indeed a family affair in the O'Regan household and I was interested to know what influence his daughters Amanda and Louise have had on the present team.

"Amanda (the present captain), obviously, from a Cork point of view has had a huge influence.

"She could have gone to any club

Said Murray: "I am astonished and disgusted. What sort of message is it sending out by ignoring female man-agers at the highest level? Denise Cronin led Cork to a Munster and All-Ireland title; Ann Downey led Kilkenny to a league and All-Ireland intermediate title, both legends of the game, yet neither even managed a nomination. As far as I am concerned they should be battling for the award!

"I have never heard of some of these people nominated. I'd like to question who came up with these nominations. With their male counterparts, the media or players who decide the teams and players of the year. But this is all top secret. I've been involved in camogie for years and I have no idea who is

involved in picking these people."

He continued: "I think this is send-

ing out a message that women are second class citizens. This is not an isolat-ed incident. The final for the last couple of years have been refereed by men. Why? Camogie President Liz Howard is saying women should have more involvement. I'd like someone to explain how Joachim Kelly, who managed Of-faly to an All-Ireland Junior final and lost, is more deserving of a nomination than Denise, who took Cork to an All-Ireland senior final and won.

Camogie's acting Ard Stiurthóir, Sinead O'Connor, last night defended the selections: "It was about what they achieved with the resources available to them. Liam Dunne was in charge of the Kilkenny U-16 team that won their fourth successive All-Ireland title. This is an extremely difficult age category as it is always hard to keep a good and strong panel but this team are feeding through to minor level.

Joachim brought Offaly camogie to within a whisker of an All-Ireland title while Clare won the All-Ireland Junior at their fourth attempt.

"Counties like Cork have a huge amount of talent, huge base of players, massive experience and leaders. You have to put things into perspective."

O'Connor cited the work being done in the Connacht counties of Roscommon, Sligo and Mayo as an example of efforts being undertaken to lengthen the game's reach, while also pointing out that there are still areas in traditional counties with no camogie clubs.

The association's four-year Strategic Plan expires this year and further plans are already being put in place. A strategic review of the association's structures are currently ongoing.



Tipperary girls built the foundation for victory in the opening half when aided by the



Indeed, the Tribeswomen have to be favoured to progress to the knockout stages again in 2009. In the other group, All-Ireland champions Cork have been drawn with Tipperary, Kilkenny and Dublin.

Galway have a slightly tougher draw in the National Camogie League where they will renew their rivalry with Cork, Wexford and Limerick. Dates for both the National League and championship will be released in the coming weeks

Galway's intermediates who were denied a place in the All-Ireland decider after Kilkenny struck for a late goal in their semi-final replay should be happy with their respective league and championship draws for 2009. In the spring, they will face Cork, Wexford and Waterford in Division 2 while, later in the year, they will meet Clare (second team), Wexford and Derry.

In the minor championship, which will now be played after the Leaving Cert. exams, Galway have been drawn against Antrim, with the winners facing the losers of the Cork v Clare opening round clash.

Meanwhile, Athenry's Jessica Gill - top markswoman in the All-Ireland senior championship - celebrated her 19th birthday by collecting her first Camogie All-Star at the awards ceremony in the City West Hotel, Dublin last Saturday night. Given one of the six defensive positions, Trish had been nominated along with seventeen others to slot into those areas and the announcement at Camogie's big celebration and glamour night in Dublin's City West Hotel in association with O'Neill's was greeted warmly by the large attendance.

Her selection was announced by Evanne Ni Chuallain who with her RTE colleague Michael Lyster compered the evening's event. The citation stated that Trish had played in a number of positions over the years but in 2008 she played the best camogie of her career in defence being fully deserving of her first All-

First to congratulate her when she left the podium was her sister Jenny who was a member of the All-Ireland junior winning team of 2001 which Trish captained against Offaly. Indeed, Trish won two All-Ireland medals that day being a sub on the senior team that went on to defeat Kilkenny and bring Tipp a three-in-arow achievement. Trish has been on the senior team since, lining out in several positions. This year team manager John McGrath slotted her into the centre back berth and she made it her own throughout the season.

This event sits right up there with the Vodafone hurling and football annual awards at the same venue and an attendance of around seven hundred people from all over the land provided a tremendous atmosphere. Unlike the other awards, however, nominees and recipients are not necessarily from senior teams and quite a number were included from junior countries such as Clare, Offaly and Antrim. Rather surprisingly, Clare as All-Ireland junior champions who might well have expected to be given representation in the final shake-up failed, whereas Offaly, the team they defeated in the All-Ireland final was honoured with its first All-Star. There was ample compensation for Clare, however, when Roseingrave received the award for Young Player of the Year.

By far the biggest representation present came

from Offaly and they had plenty to shout about when Michaela Morkan from Shinrone joined Trish O'Halloran as a member of the team's back division. Michaela is a past pupil of Borrisokane Community College and played camogie there, winning a Munster medal two years ago. County Board chairman Lar O'Brien led a strong Tipp representation that included secretary Lisa Carroll, treasurer Rose Mannion, team manager John McGrath and selectors Marion Graham and John Ryan.

When introducing Brendan Cummins Liz Howard described him as the outstanding hurling goalkeeper for the past number of years with an impressive list of honours including four All-Star awards won. But, she added, it was Brendan the important.

"Last year Brendan was dropped (from the Tipp team) sensationally and indeed unfairly, then I saw the measure of the man that he was. He never went to the papers. Then we saw the blue and gold, his sup-

port for the man who took his place in goals and never did I admire anybody more than I admired Brendan Cummins. He won the admiration of people throughout the country," she said. In his address Brendan

congratulated all nominees and award recipients and spoke of the power that existed in all players to inspire a community, a county and, on the big stage in Croke Park, a country. This was something players should never underestimate. It was what they all strove to do when they put on the county or club jersey. While success, however, could only be achieved by team work and collective effort, occasions like this All-Stars night were very special. They recognised the place of individuals who went above and beyond the call of duty in man that was much more any given year. If there was any advice he could give to the young players among them it might be to use that night as a stepping stone to their career and as a confidence boost to go on to bigger and greater things.

Brendan said team his dignity, his support for managers also had an important part to play and

he cited the fact that some hurling managers throughout the country had found themselves in difficulties.

"Players, be they hurlers or camogie players put so much into the games and we expect so much professionalism. Managers who can bring discipline to the environment, who help to develop our skills and allow a team to be the best it can be, are so important.

The reality of our games is that only one team can win but there is great satisfaction as players, if you can cope with your manager and the squad throughout the year and at the end of the year say, yes, I'm a better player. I think that's all any of us can ask for" he said.


John Harkin's charges know only too well that each and every player will have to be at her very best on Sunday and that every

They got their first taste of provincial competition facing Myshall of Carlow, a very experienced side, but with home advantage the Laois club overcame their first hurdle. A place in the Leinster final was achieved defeating the Westmeath champions

and as luck would have it the venue was on their own doorstep.

Celbridge of Kildare provided the opposition and it was the Kildare champions that had halted the progress of their predecessors. This was a thrilling encounter and the visitors threw all their experience at the first timers but two great second half goals ensured victory for the Laois champions.

With thir first two titles on the sideboard the team were anxious to go one better. Their first excursion outside Durrow led them to McDonagh Park in Nenagh facing the Queens of the Deise, Gaultier. This was an opportunity for the Laois champions to match their skills against the best of the Golden Vale.

In the opening half the Munster champions were the superior outfit but a great second half saw the Laois side pull away and claim a place in their first all-Ireland final. If they had been lucky with home venue in Leinster then they could hardly believe their good fortune when O'Moore Park was the venue for the all-Ireland final on a bitterly cold and wet November day. Keady of Armagh were the Ulster champions for a second year in a row and despite travelling carried the favourites tag. The Harps had prepared well and with time running out clung on to a narrow lead. Their defence was superb and at full time Denise Quigley entered the history books by becoming the first Laois camogie player to lift an all-Ireland

trophy

Winning an all-Ireland title is great but defending successfully takes a supreme effort but that is what the Harps did after retaining their county and provincial titles last year. They faced Keady again in better conditions but this time they were even more impressive.

This year they recieved a severe test from St. Brighid's in the county final but retained their crown. Shinrone did test their resolve in the provincial final but at the Offaly venue the Laois champions collected a third Leinster title.

Casement Park, Belfast was their next port of call for a third all-Ireland semi-final appearance. New champions across the border, Lavey of Derry, had stepped down a grade and in a bone crunching battle Louise Mahoney led by example and the Laois side were in a third final.

Kilmayley of Clare include a number of girls from the Banner all-Ireland winning team. They were impressive in Munster and experienced little difficulty in overcoming the Connacht champions

in the semi-final.

The venue for Sunday's final sees the Harps return to McDonagh Park in Nenagh, the scene of their great first semi-final victory over Gaultier. If they play as well as they have played all year then history is in the making but one wonders if Louise is contained will they be in trouble. The Laois girls will have one major advantage - experience and that will be vital in an all-ireland final.

Gods smile on captain O'Driscoll

Eoin Brennan talks to Kilmaley's Emma O'Driscoll about what has been a dream year to date, as she looks ahead to the biggest game

KILMALEY captain O'Driscoll must be thinking the Gods are certainly smiling on her. Only 22, her first year in the leadership role has yielded Kilmaley's first senior county success after being defeated in the last two deciders as well as a first Munster Junior title, and now on the eve of an All-Ireland Junior final, she is counting her blessings in what has been a rollercoaster few weeks for the club.

"It's unbelievable. This year has been a year of firsts for the club with the county final and the Munster final so to get to the All-Ireland final is just an amazing feeling to be honest.

"Our goal at the start of the year was just to win the county championship. It was our third crack at it so really that was our only target. So when we finally won that, we took anything that came after that as a bonus and everytime, you win one match, you begin to think 'What would it be like to win the next one?' We have been steadily improving I think in every game so we just took one match at a time and just went out determined to give it a good lash."

A feature of Kilmaley's success this year has been the almost seamless blend of youth and experience that runs throughout the side, particularly county experience from both the minor panel who reached their first All-Ireland minor A final this year (Sarah Reidy, Eimear Considine, Shona Enright and Sinead O'Halloran) and the Junior panel who won the All-Ireland junior title in September (Den-



ise Lynch, Shona Enright and Claire McMahon), with Helen McMahon also having a wealth of county expe-

"We gel really well together. We have the younger players like Katie Cahill, Deirdre Kelleher and Lisa Kennedy who have just joined us this year and then we have plenty of experience in Denise Lynch, Claire Mc-Mahon, Helen McMahon, Siobhan White and Dympna Killeen, players who have given plenty of service to the club without ever receiving constant success and now we are all going forward together.

"I think for any club to come up to senior, while we did get to finals fairly quickly, it is very hard for any team to win a senior championship, not having been in one for a couple of years. I really think it takes a lot of experience in county championships to win one. Since 2004, when we

won the intermediate championship, we were experiencing senior finals but to finally get over the line, you have to be competing at senior level for a number of years. This year, the amount of work we have put in, it just had to be our year."

Still, Kilmaley for all their momenturn and confidence gained over the last few weeks are up against it on Sunday against Harps who are bidding for their third successive All-Ireland championship. O'Driscoll admits to not knowing too much about the Laois champions but also confesses that perhaps that could suit

"We know very little about Harps and really I would prefer that. Any match we have played as an underdog, we have done much better. All we can do is go out and give it everything and hope to God we can do it because we have avoided predicting anything this year. Everything that has come, has been an unbelievable bonus so it's just fingers crossed for this match and hopefully our best is good enough."

Despite captaining her side to two cups already, the opportunity to lift a national trophy would be the pinnacle of a tremendous year for Emma O'Driscoll. The final hurdle is in the lap of the Gods but they have certainly been good to her so far.


"We travelled down on the Thursday night and stayed in the Midway Park Hotel in Tullamore.

O'Connor dreaming of perfect return

IT READS like the script of an Emilio Estevez movie. Team comes from nowhere to win Vhi Healthcare All-Ireland Ladies Club Intermediate Football final. Raucous celebrations ensue.

All they think about in their debut season at senior level is consolidation. Then they lose one of the generation's most gifted forwards, hobbled by a cruciate knee ligament. They have no hope.

But against all the odds, they slay the giants of their county. Then they claim provincial honours. And crazily, they reach the All-Ireland final. Hail the Mighty Ducks! It was fairytale stuff for Inch Rovers, alright, but the emotions were more complex for the east Cork side's absent star, Mary O'Connor. It was a nightmare feeling so helpless, and making it back to the decider against Carnacon again tomorrow represents a shot at redemption for her and her team-mates, following last season's one-sided defeat.

"A good friend of mine told me last year that 12 months wouldn't be long coming around but at the time, it didn't feel like it," she says.

"When we won the intermediate, the whole parish was on a high after that. We said we'd take each game

as it comes at senior level. But the players were in good form, they get on really well with each other and they'd play all year for you. It's a very young panel as well, apart from myself. But our aim was just to do ourselves justice.

'We probably caught Donoughmore on the hop in the semi-final last year and it just snowballed from there. I have to say it was very difficult to watch but obviously you were glad for the girls."

O'Connor is one of the most successful Irish sportswomen of the current era. A quick glance at her resumé reveals four All-Ireland football medals with Cork, six in

A football All-Star in 2006, she was named camogie's Player of the Year that same season and has two All-Stars for her exploits with the camán. Add nine camogie league medals, three in football and a plethora of club mementoes, and you get a pretty decent picture.

It would have been easy given such a high level of achievement to pack it in after suffering such a seri-ous injury at 30, but O'Connor is much too stubborn for that. As it happens, she hasn't decided if she'll continue with Cork next year, but reading between the lines, it's more

"It's been a long enough year. At the moment I'm happy, I'm injury free. I came back because I wanted to end my inter-county career on my own terms and not be forced into it by injury.

"I often say I'll be watching it long enough and I've been so lucky. I was playing inter-county football for Cork for 11 years without winning anything, so the last four years have been a fairytale.

"At the moment I'm enjoying playing both football and camogie with Cork but I just don't know yet. And I'm not arrogant enough to presume that I'll be asked back anyway, or to say that I'm needed.

We'll just have to see." As Games Development Officer with the Camogie Association, O'Connor spends a lot of time on the road and has tried to cut down on the mileage in the lead-up to Sunday. Just last week she was in Donegal, Galway, Dundalk, Dublin,

Cork, Dublin and Cork from Tuesday to Sunday. It can be draining but it will be all systems go in Tullamore tomorrow, when it's time to meet a Carnacon side powered by Cora Staunton, Martha Carter, Fiona McHale and the McGings; a Carnacon side that made light work of Inch in last year's final.
