



CONNACHT Senior B camogie champions HRC Mountbellew failed in their bid to reach the All Ireland schools final when falling heavily to Colaiste Choilm, Balincollig last week in Mountbellew.

Despite a gallant second half showing the Mountbellew girls were simply outclassed by a stronger, faster, and more skillful Balincollig side. The writing was on the wall as early as the 18th minute as the Mountbellew school trailed by five points and showed no signs of recovering the deficit.

Most of the damage up front was inflicted by lively half forwards Elaine Scally and Patricia Buttimer, who wreaked havoc from the plentiful supply of ball fed in by midfielders Sarah Buckley and Jessica Hennigan. Buttimer was particularly troublesome to the Mountbellew defence in the first half sniping two superb points, while Scally proved a constant thorn on the left wing.

Mountbellew danger woman Aine Mannion, who picked of 1-8 in the Connacht final, was never allowed the space and freedom required to seriously impact on the scoreboard. Indeed, at one turn, the Ahascragh centre forward gathered possession only to be swallowed up by a sea of blue jerseys. The dominant nature of the Balincollig defence was encapsulated by the fact that Mountbellew only hit one point from play over the hour.

The contest opened in whirlwind fashion with the Munster champions wasting little time in setting about their task. After seven minutes the forecast looked extremely worrying for Mountbellew as they trailed by 0-4 to 0-0. Aine Mannion converted a free subsequently, but it was to be her side's solitary score until Mannion herself converted a second free in first-half injury

time.

In the interim, Balincollig upped the tempo to a level which Mountbellew simply had no answer to. Sarah Buckley clipped over two frees and a '45 either side of a wonderful point from Patricia Buttimer. Further salt was added to Mountbellew's wounds when corner forward Emma Crowley registered the game's first goal on 27 minutes. The goal stretched the Cork schools' lead to ten points. A rout looked ominous.

Buckley further extended the Balincollig's advantage with a converted free. In response, the best Mountbellew could conjure up was a pointed free from the stick of Aine Mannion.

To be fair, Mountbellew did come agonisingly close to finding the back of the net. Half back Laura Donnellan burst through the heart of the Balincollig defence with a searing run, finding the unmarked Aileen Carthy with a superb hand pass, only for Carthy's effort to be brilliantly stopped by 'keeper Aileen Sheehan in the Balincollig goals.

Indeed, Sheehan brought off one outstanding second half stop from Michelle Burke at a time when a Mountbellew goal would have most certainly lifted the spirits of the home side.





People and Places Vera Mannion was a member of the only Mayo camogie team ever to reach an All-Ireland senior final



Vera Mannion and camogie's golden age

People and Places Michael Commins

VERA Mannion, Balla, who died in recent weeks, was a member of the only Mayo camogie team ever to reach an All-Ireland senior final. That was back in 1959 when the girls from Mayo played Dublin in the decider at Croke Park. She was a first cousin of Kilkenny hurling legend. Eddie Keher.

Formerly McDonnell from Skiddernagh, Manulla, Vera displayed an interest in sport from an early age. In the mid to late 1950s, camogie found a new lease of life in Mayo and was a popular sport in a number of parishes. With people like the late PJ Hennelly of Manulla, who later became general manager of the Connaught Telegrapi the late Gerry Bracken of Newport, former editor of The Mayo News, the game received extensive publicity and this generated a lot of support for camogie in the county. Tony Gibbons from Newport was also associated with the team management in that era.

Vera was one of those who had a natural talent for camogle and she soon graduated to the senior ranks. It was a very proud day for all associated with the sport when Josie Ruane from Keelogues led the team onto Croke Park. on that far off day almost 50 years ago. As things transpired, Dublin proved far too strong for the Mayo girls on the day and recorded a comfortable victory. Yet, the memory of that journey bonded together all who were part of it and established friendships for life.

Later times saw Vera take on the job of referee and she handled many of the big games on the national circuit. In October 1964, she refereed the All-Ireland senior final between Dublin and Antrim which, once again, was won by the Dublin girls. The same year, she was chosen as referee for the inter-provincial final between Munster and Leinster which was played in Cahir. Co Tipperary. She was also a regular attender at All Ireland camogic finals

Kathleen McEvilly (nee Staunton) from Killawalla, a member of the 1959 Mayo team, said Vera made a huge contribution to the game of camogle in Mayo. "She was secretary of the camogle board for a good many years. Vers had a special way with people. She was such a lady, a really lovely person."

Vera was daughter of Mamie and James (better known as "Son") McDonnell and was the only girl in a family of five. She did clerical work in Castlebar Bacon Factory for a number of years. But sport was to play a huge role in her young life and it was an interest that stayed with her right to the end.

Apart from her time spent playing with Mayo, she also took an active interest in Balla GAA club and served in various officerships with the club. Her abiding passion in sport was GAA even though she was also an

A lady of gentle and quiet disposition, Vera was very well liked and highly respected in the Balla and Manufla communities. She was involved with the Social Services in Balla for many years and her compassionate nature

News of her very sudden death came as a huge shock to the people of the area. She and her husband Noel had attended a Mayo County Council dinner dance in Castlebar just a few hours earlier.

Vera was devoted to her family and friends. She was very much a part of the Balla community over the years and had friends in many parts of the country through her involvement in the carriogin association. She will be greatly missed by all who knew her







O Donnovan Rossa's Camogie star and Antrim's first All Star in 2008. Jane Adams has been ruled out of the 2009 season through injury. This week she speaks 'From the Heart' to HURLING WORLD.

How did you become involved with camogie?

Well my daddy used to be a boxer and I was the first one that came into Camogie and then the rest of the family followed. I am the eldest of four. My first school was the primary school and they didn't have a Camogie Team at the time so I played in goals for the hurling team. I loved it from the start. We live behind a school I would jump over the wall and practice on my own, solo running and so on. We won one of the leagues and that was the first time our school ever won anything. Then later that year in the Belfast versus Dublin tournament that I captained, we beat Dublin for the first time. I was eleven.

Did you play Camogie in secondary school?

After primary school I went into St Louise's Comprehensive College but it only had Camogie from about 5th year so there wasn't anything there. Then in '95 we went down to Limerick with Féile - The first time we had ever won Antrim, we beat Loughgiel who had been our main rivals and we actually won

When did you start playing senior?

After that then when I was thirteen I played U-16 County and then when I was 15, I came onto the senior panel with Jim Nelson and John Crotty. They wrapped me in cotton wool and didn't want me playing too many matches. We went on to win the Junior All Ireland I was just a sub on and off the team when Antrim beat Cork. Then when I was 16 they upgraded me, so I had to play senior.

Rossa has been very successful in recent years.

In 2000 we broke through and won the Antrim Championship for the first time in Rossa's History and since then we have won 7. The first year we beat Cushendall in the final. We beat Dunloy first and then Loughgiel, the 2 that were always going to beat us. So it was quite a big thing for us. We have won 5 in a row in Antrim. 5 in a row in Ulster and 5 in a row

When did you damage your Knee?

'Bourne supremacy

Pat Treacy documents the emergence of Waterford Institute of Technology as the third level's foremost camogie nursery

Waterford Institute of Technology, over the last 25 years, has set the standard for all third level GAA clubs.

Their approach to gaelic games has been one of excellence across the board. They are now a renowned nursery. While the South East-based college is widely celebrated for its hurling achievements, WIT is now just as much a standard bearer for camogie. The past decade has seen them annex the Ashbourne Cup on four occasions, along with numerous league titles during the same period.

The success that has unfolded in recent times could not have happened without the excellence, professionalism and pure pride that courses through the veins of a highly organized club. This spring's Ashbourne success was spearheaded by manager Helena Jacob (a member of the renowned Wexford family). Her third year in charge saw WIT reach their third final in a row, winning in 2009 and '10.

Incredibly, it is her tenth year involved. "I played with the team for five years," she says. "I have been a selector, and then the manager, for the past five years." Here is the WIT way: a continuous link between student, player, employee and management.

Helena is working in WIT's Campus Services and continues to serve the GAA cause. She relates: "I've had great support from the selectors. Conor Phelan, the former Kilkenny hurler and a former student, is the current GAA Development Officer. Current Waterford county camogie player Pauline Cunningham is also on our backroom team. The theme of WIT GAA down through the years is to be as good as we can. We are endeavouring to maintain that ethos and that standard. So far, thankfully, it is paying off."

It has been a long and sometimes torturous road to the top of the Ashbourne Cup tree. The road began in 1984 with the formation of a camogie club in what was then Waterford Regional Technical College (WRTC). Dominance in the Purcell Cup – three wins in four years, along with three Division 1 league titles in the 1990s – had WRTC knocking for entry to the

Ashbourne Cup, which was only open to universities at that juncture. A reorganization of the two competitions later in the 1990s allowed entry to the top level of colleges camogie.

1999 will never be forgotten. It was the first visit for the Ashbourne Cup – a victory all the sweeter after heartbreaking defeat in 1998's decider. 1999 saw WIT reverse that result

against the same opponents, UCC, on Valentine's Day in Athlone. Pain and hurt lurched into joy and ecstasy.

WIT thereby became the first nonuniversity side to win this title. Add in the hurlers' success a few weeks later in the Fitzgibbon Cup, which gained the college's first double, and there was one hell of a party.

That first victory was fitting reward

for the time, effort and belief that the management team of Sheila O'Donohoe and Colm Bonnar had given over the previous decade. Their double act brought camogie to a new level of skill and success. Equally, both Sheila and Colm were to the fore in having WIT accepted into the Ashbourne Cup.

During 1999's celebrations, as a tribute to the former Tipperary All-Ireland hurler, the panel presented Bonnar with a luminous jacket. His rendition of the rock 'n' roll classic 'Tutti Frutti' during post-final fun inspired this choice of memento for the bainisteoir. That touch is the sort of atmosphere and attitude that prevails in WIT.

They were back in the winner's enclosure in 2001, defeating the University of Limerick in a dramatic final. Having gotten over UCC in a gruelling semi-final, WIT trailed by seven points as the game entered its last ten minutes. Two goals in a three-minute blast gave Waterford the momentum to snatch victory by two points, 2-7 to 1-8.

The Noughties proved a barren period so far as the Ashbourne Cup was concerned. However, success beckoned again in the latter years of the decade. Defeat to UCD in 2008 was followed by victory over the same opposition in 2009, denying the Metropolitans a much coveted three in a row. The hurlers completed WIT's second double a few weeks later, winning an epic Fitzgibbon Cup Final after extra time against Limerick Institute of Technology.

Then, for the first time in their history, WIT retained the Ashbourne Cup in 2010. They won their fourth title by seeing off UCC's challenge once again. The college had gained another massive boost.

Helena Jacob was particularly pleased with the spread of players from various counties. She remarks: "It was noticeable this year that Waterford had seven members of the winning squad. Camogie is really on the way up in Waterford and it's brilliant to see so many on our team."

Helena continued: "We would like to think that we are contributing to the great work being done in Waterford, and in all of the counties represented on our team. I was also delighted to see four of our players receiving Ashbourne All Stars: Collette Dormer at wing-back, midfielder Karina Parrock, wing-forward

Trish Jackman and our captain Ursula Jacob, who got the full-forward berth."

One name that keeps cropping up when you mention camogle in WIT is Westmeath native Sheila O'Donohoe. Since she came to WRTC in 1988, Sheila has been involved over the past 20 odd years in every aspect of the club: administrator, selector and overall organizer. She is the current camogie Treasurer.

Sheila won three Ashbourne Cup medals with UCD prior to arriving in Waterford. This experience was invaluable to her new college's camogie aspirations. Sheila embraced her new surroundings from the beginning, recognizing the truly integrated nature of this club as regards its embrace of both codes.

Her enthusiasm and love of camogie is truly infectious. Above all, though, she has been a real friend and confidante to all the players for more than two decades. Sheila O'Donohoe is one of those unsung heroes (or should that be heroines...). A wonderful woman, all told.

Looking forward, I asked the current camogie manager whether she would stay on for a crack at the three in a row next year. Helena replied: "I suppose if they want me I'll give it a shot. We have a lot of the current panel available again. So hopefully we will give it a real go. But nothing is easy and the standard is rising all the time."

WIT is now one of the top nurseries for GAA players across the country. The results in various competitions speak for themselves. With people of the quality of Colm Bonnar, Helena Jacob, Sheila O'Donohoe and Conor Phelan, amongst many others, the college will surely continue in this role for years to come.

IT MAY be clichéd. We may have exhausted plaudits placed upon the typically anonymous volunteer involved in GAA.

Managers and players in their hour of glory pay tribute to the figures who did the ground work, those who carried out the often thankless tasks thus ensuring a player, club or county reached the top.

Being a volunteer doesn't necessarily mean that you train an underage side. There are numerous facets to being a volunteer. The Camogie Association aims to have over 60,000 people at the 2015 All-Ireland Camogie Finals and to increase its membership base by 40% over the next five years.



Speaking this weekend at the Association's National Congress in Kildare President Joan O'Flynn described the goals, which are part of the Association's National Development Plan as 'achievable and realistic' but she stressed it would require all elements of the organisation working in tandem in order to achieve this.

"This is the roadmap for the Association over the next five years. We have a strategy which focuses on participation and growing the game of camogie. For instance, if you look at our current club base we have over 540 clubs and we intend to grow that to over 750 by 2015. The key is to ensure that all elements of the association, full-time team, voluntary committees, provincial councils and county boards get behind this plan and work to achieve the goals that have been set."

'Our Game, Our Passion', The Camogie Association National Development Plan 2010-2015 was unveiled to over 150 delegates Saturday afternoon. President of the GAA Christy Cooney also addressed the gathering and highlighted the strong and vibrant working relationship between both

Congress delegates also voted unanimously to adopt the motion proposing the compulsory use of helmets for all players engaged in training and playing. The rule will come into force at the beginning of next year.

The 2011 Congress will take place in Ulster with Belfast the proposed venue for the event.

Camogie membership drive

THE Camogie Association plans to expand its membership and club base by 40% over the next five years and to put systems in place in the four remaining counties that don't have a board structure.

These are key features of their National Development Plan - 'Our Game, Our Passion' - which will be launched at the annual Congress in Newbridge this weekend.

Association president Joan O'Flynn is satisfied their target is 'realistic,' commenting: "We have 540 clubs at the moment and by 2015 we are aiming to

They also hope to strengthen their international base, to get away from a reliance on emigrants to help form

"We're changing tactics, she says." "We'll be trying to develop under-age camogie and in that we have targeted London and North America for the next six years.

There is a challenge out there and it's a difficult time in terms of resources but the 'driver' is people's passion for camogic and the voluntary commitment people have towards the

The motivation, she agrees, is provide the opportunity for 'every youngster wanting to take up the

game.
"We want to put in place a proactive strategy where we are going to go out and target areas and clubs where there is no camogie with a view to growing it there. In particular we are targeting hurling clubs - areas where there is hurling but there isn't camogie - so girls get the same opportunity to play the national game as boys!"

Their last strategic plan (2004/2008) was successful in terms of growing their club base by 20%, with new county boards established in Mayo,

Kerry and Donegal. The hope is that by 2015, the for-

mation of boards in Fermanagh, Sligo, Leitrim and Longford will give them a 32 county spread.

Cork dual star Mary O'Connor is Director of Camogie, working in tandem with five Regional Directors and recently Mayo ladies footballer Claire Egan was appointed as Director of Communication and Marketing.

Central to their effort in growing the game is the 'Player Pathway' strategy , described as a six-phase model of 'a player's journey through camogie."

We have been focusing on developing young players from the age they take up the game - usually around six right through to retirement as a player and then continuing an involve-ment in the association," stated Joan O'Flynn

The idea is that coaches, members and players would be able to identify what kind of skills a player should be acquiring at different levels."

While Ladies Football continues to thrive at home and abroad, the camogie president doesn't see the two sports being in competition.

"That question is put to me quite a lot and my answer is that we are both in the same business of trying to get young females to play Gaelic games.

When you look at the demograph-there are 400,000 girls aged between 5 and 15 on the island, so there's more than enough for both of

us there. As it stands, only a fraction of those are playing sport, so the more we can get girls playing sport the more each of our associations will benefit. I don't think it's healthy to be seeing ourselves as 'opposition' to each

Among the motions to be debated at Congress is one from the Central Council which proposes to make helmets compulsory for training and games. Based on the GAA standard, the idea is that the rule would come into force at the beginning of next year

To be truthful there is a very high level of helmet-wearing in camogie because it's mandatory for under-18's anyway. So, any player who takes up camogie is going to come into the game wearing a helmet, but we are conscious that there are a number of players who don't."

Joan O'Flynn agrees that the success-ful implementation of their Development Plan will be dependant on all elements of the association working in unison. In other words, it will require the full-time team, national voluntary committees, provincial councils and county boards to all get behind it and

"Roadmaps can just sit in the glove compartments of cars or they can actually help you on the journey. So, hopefully ours is a fully-fledged sat nav system and we'll get to our destination by 2015.

"I think there has been serious progress in recent years and much more of an awareness of being proactive and going out there and introducing the game to people who have no background in camogie.

"We need to be missionary about the game and to be advocates for the game and draw people into it. People enjoy the game and have been thrilled at the skill levels, the competitiveness and the athleticism. They see it as not only an attractive sport to play but also an attractive sport to watch!'

Cooney and Tom Kenny also have daughters playing.

Geraldine is delighted to see that a new national Player Pathway development programme is one of the key elements being adopted at camogie's annual congress in Newbridge this weekend, where helmets are also expected to become mandatory.

'Camogie has made huge progress in recent years," she says. "Since the game went 15-a-side, it has changed hugely skill-wise and is now on the same lines as hurling. There's huge work being done nationally by Mary O'Connor and her team of development officers.

"Public awareness has grown hugely, too, but there's still plenty of room for improvement and certainly more double-headers with men's games would help further," she said.



The structure of the minor championship was changed in 2009 and this meant that Kilkenny played only 2 matches to reach the All Ireland Final. In their opening match, they defeated Dublin and in the semi-final they defeated Tipperary and earned the right to play Clare in the final,

The final was Kilkenny's best performance of the season with the bulk of the damage being done in the opening half and the half-time scoreboard showing them ahead by 5-5 to 1-4. The Kilkenny goals came from Denise Gaule (2), Claire Phelan (2) and Shelly Farrell. The second half was a much tighter affair with Clare outscoring Kilkenny but the damage had been done and Kilkenny just did enough to keep the scoreboard ticking over.

This was Kilkenny's fourth final appearance and their second meeting with Clare in a final. Kilkenny have yet to taste defeat in this competition and a five goal spree in the opening half provided the platform for Kilkenny to retain their All Ireland crown and achieve an incredible four-in-a-row All Ireland minor camogie titles when they defeated Clare. The final score was Kilkenny 5-10 to Clare's 3-8.

They retained their u16A Leinster Title in sunny Slieverue during August, following a hard fought victory over Wexford. They were pushed all the way but the players responded well and showed that they were not going to give up their Leinster crown without a fight and they won out on a final score of Kilkenny 3-9 to Wexford 3-7.

UNDER 14 REPORT

Kilkenny's Under 14 camogie team had a very successful year when they retained their Leinster Under 14 title for the seventh consecutive year with 3-14 to 3-0 win over their great rivals Dublin on July

5th. They also competed in various blitzes around the country. They became the first Kilkenny Under 14 team to win the prestigious James Hurley tournament in Mallow, when they overcame a strong Tipperary in the final by the narrowest of margins (0-8 to 1-4) in a thrilling final.

They also won the inaugural Waterford camogie inter-county tournament when they overcame a class Cork team by 4-3 to 2-4 in a cracking final with both teams giving everything to secure a victory. They also were runners up in the Orla McDonough Tournament in Tipperary when, on they way to the final, they overcame strong opposition in Limerick, Galway and Cork with good wins. Against Tipperary they just ran out of steam in the second-half and Tipperary ran out worthy winners in the final. The Kilkenny Under 14 panel were well represented from clubs all over the county and no one team dominated the panel with 19 clubs having players on the

Camogie aim is to raise the bar

THE Camogie Association aims to have over 60,000 people at their 2015 All-Ireland Camogie Finals and to increase its membership base by 40% over the next five years.

Those ambitions along with a new set of rules and a development plan for the next five years were the key items for debate at the annual Congress of Cumann Camogaiochta na nGael in Newbridge, Co. Kildare at the weekend.

"Camogie — our game, our passion" was launched by Camogie President Joan O'Flynn on Saturday and contains a 52-page blueprint for the association until 2015.

and contains a 52-page blueprint for the association until 2015.

The 'roadmap' for camogie aims to concentrate on five strategic priorities of growing participation; improving performance; supporting volunteer development and leadership; enhancing camogie's profile and achieving excellent governance and organisational development.

and achieving excellent governance and organisational development. O'Flynn says that the plan showsthe strong ambition of the association going forward.

"'Our Game Our Passion' shows how we will work energetically to achieve our ambition for this and future generations of camogie. This development plan is about pioneering ways to give mothers, daughters, sisters and families greater opportunities to be in involved in our na-

tional game. I'm confident we have captured that pioneering spirit in this Development Plan."

But O'Flynn is fully aware that the plan will have to have the full backing of members from grassroots to the top level in order for it to be implemented effec-

in order for it to be implemented effec- for association.

"It will take all of us working together to make sure it is achievable. By listening to each other, respecting each other, supporting each other we'll find strength in unity. By combining our talent, our skill and our wisdom we'll achieve much more."

GAA President Christy Cooney also addressed delegates, and paid particular attention to the issue of integration, which he believes will be fully addressed before the end of 2010. He said: "We will, this year, complete the process and complete the optimum in the way our associations work together."



Two new names were added to the GAA Player of the Month Awards list as towering Dublin midfielder Eamonn Fennell and Galway hurling's high scoring larla Tannian became the first 2010 recipients of the the awards, sponsored by Vodafone. Meanwhile the camogie Rule Book is set for a major overhaul in the coming months.

Among the new rules are a name change for the association to 'An Cumann Camogaiochta'; a revised structure for transfers, hearings and disciplinary matters; the incorporation of delegates from primary and secondary schools into county boards; the composition of Ard Chomhairle and the safeguarding of children.

Workshops will be held in Dublin, Tullamore, Armagh and Waterford during April, with a view to getting feedback on the new rules, which are set to be voted upon at a special congress on May 22nd.

Delegates also overwhelmingly backed the compulsory wearing of helmets and face guards for adult players from 2011 by a 68-2 margin. All clubs are now obliged to purchase three All-Ireland camogie final tickets instead of two, and a new All-Ireland Club Intermediate championship will be introduced this year.

It was also confirmed that the 2011 Camogie Congress will take place in Belfast on March 25 and MAR 2010

individuals and committees have written their club's history.

It's not an easy task. Sourcing knowledge, memorabilia and statistics, scouring through page after page of yellow, fragile newspapers endeavouring to find even a paragraph that may have been written about your club is not en-

Of course when the book goes to print and you affectionately run your hand over the glossy cover, you forget all of that and triumphantly smile.

Imagine the daunting task of being asked to write the history of an association 106-years-old, particularly an association which very little would have been written about in the early stages.

Well that's what Cork's Mary Moran, Kildare's Eoghan Corry and Wexford's Alan Ahern have been asked to undertake. They head up the camogie communications committee and will write Camogie's Story.

The story of camogie in chronological order promises to be a fascinating read.

Mary's responsibility is to actually write the story and really there was no other candidate considered. With six camogie manuscripts accomplished to date and an incredible library of information stored in both hard and soft copy, camogie's own Jimmy Magee is unrivalled in her knowledge.

Mary states that she would like to have the book completed while Uachtarán Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael Joan O'Flynn holds office. Joan has another two years of her term to run. "This was something Joan had in mind when she entered office and I'd like to see it completed before she leaves," says Mary.

So what will go into the book?

"All the All-Irelands will of course have to go in from 1932. Stories, pictures and statistics, things that both helped and hindered us to develop, the prejudice that was there in the past against women playing sport, rule changes, presidents, everything really that tells the story of camogie's evolvement into the wonderful association we have today."

I wonder if there is anyone in the country to have held in their chosen sport as many administrative positions

When I started to list them I was in awe. Without doubt Mary is the ultimate all-rounder with more than a basic knowledge of all roles.

Upon returning from Dublin Mary rejoined Old Al's and became delegate to the county board. The following year she was nominated by her club to become chairwoman. Mary allowed her name to go forward for one reason only... "I didn't think I'd get it."

Many other names that would have had experience in that area were also nominated however before the big day they all withdrew. Mary suddenly found herself chairwoman of the board and was 'extremely nervous.' But being Mary she took it on and remained as Cork chairwoman for 10 years, leaving the position in 1977. From there she be-

On top of that Mary has trained Cork teams to win minor, junior and senior All-Ireland titles.

While it's difficult to pick out a favourite period during the years, when pushed Mary says that being involved in colleges camogie was the most enjoyable. "We were very close. We were great friends and worked well together,' referring to Agnes Purcell, Rosina Mc-Manus and Lily Spence.

"I really enjoyed seeing talented young players coming through for the first time and following them all the way. Claire Lynch of St Raphael's was the best I saw," says Mary. "She could do it all in first year."

Of the game today Mary agrees that camogie could do with some of the weaker counties coming strong again.

Dublin were such a phenomenal force in camogie and still hold the record with 26 titles. No doubting the fact they will be surpassed shortly by Cork and indeed left behind. Having witnessed Dublin's dominance in earlier years Mary claims: "Dublin were so strong at one point that they could have fielded a second All-Ireland winning side. If someone told me then that Dublin would win one All-Ireland in 42 years there is no way I'd have believed it."

The amount of effort Mary is putting into this book is phenomenal and her one request is that anyone with any information, stories or interest in camogie regardless of whether they played or not would contact her. She would love to hear from them. Your memories might be more precious than you

Galway's seniors throw away a winning hand in camogie league semis

"SAME old Galway" was the phrase aptly used to describe Galway's collapse in the National Senior camogie league semi-final at O'Connor Park, Tullamore on Sat-

Having commanded proceedings for the three quarters of the contest, Noel Finn's charges were guilty of throwing away an eight point lead inside the final ten minutes of action.

Despite a five point interval advantage, the Tribeswomen registered only one second half score from play, contrasted sharply by a blistering 2-5 from the Kilkenny attack in the final ten minutes, ensuring their place in the League final.

Indeed, for the second successive time, the Cats' progression to a final has been borne

out of Galway's ineptitude to close out the tie. In essence, this current Galway squad, with the exclusion of their '08 semi-final win over Wexford, has been plagued by semi-final defeats and incapacity to deliver on the big day.

Most disheartening to witness during the final quarter was the manner in which Galway accepted their fate Not one player in a maroon and white jersey offered resistance to the Kilkenny comeback. The midfield duo of Orla Kilkenny and Paula Kenny melted under the heat of the Cats' challenge, while the half back line which had been dominant, suddenly disappeared as Ann Downey's charges poured forward at every opportunity.

Ironically, though, it was a lethargic Kilkelly performance as the Westerners controlled the tie for large periods. By the 13th minute, Galway led 0-5 to 0-2, with Aislinn Connolly proving deadly accurate from the placed ball, converting four early free's - Mitchell also adding to the Galway tally.

In response, Aoife Neary (free) and Katie Power tallied for the black and amber side. Therese Maher and Aoife Neary (free) then traded scores before Emma Kilkelly registered a terrific score of the left to stretch Galway four ahead.

Connolly sniped three points subsequently, with Ann Dalton and Katie Power replying for Kilkenny points - the latter capitalising on a poor clearance out of defence from Susan Earner to leave Galway 0-10 to 0-5 ahead at the break.

In truth, Galway should have held an even more commanding lead by this stage, but some poor shooting would ultimately prove costly. Still, they continued to hold the upper hand. Connolly landed an early

play, Dalton and Connolly traded efforts before Sarah Dervan provided Kilkenny an opportunity to resurrect their fading league campaign as the Mullagh women was adjudged to have fouled Denise Gaule inside the small rectangle.

The penalty struck by Gaule was excellently stopped by Susan Earner and the subsequent series of events suggested it was to be Galway's day. Firstly, Sarah Dervan flicked Aoife Neary's goal bound hand pass off the line before Brenda Hanney expertly flicked a high ball to the net to leave Kilkenny trailing 1-12 to 0-7 in arrears.

However, the intensity of Galway's play decreased drastically from there in as Kilkenny gained a stranglehold in the encounter. Neary slotted a free between the sticks, followed by two more from captain Ann

Indeed, it was Dalton who delivered the first major blow to Galway's league aspirations, finding the net from a '21 yard free with six minutes remaining. All of sudden, there were only two points in it and Galway appeared dead on their

The goal proved to be a real litmus test for the two sides as Kilkenny grew in momentum with every passing second while the Galway challenge simply wilted beyond all belief.

Michelle Quilty cut the deficit to the minimum before Katie Power levelled proceedings on 58 minutes. Galway, however, were not without their chances in those dying moments as both Niamh McGrath and Emma Kilkelly shot unforgivable wides.

In the driving seat, a hopeful deliverance from midfield caught full back Sarah Dervan

In the ensuing passages of Collette Dormer found herself in possession on the edge of the Galway square with not a maroon jersey in sight. Dormer's finish was both clinical and cruel.

he Camogie Association aims to have over 60,000 people at the 2015 All-Ireland Camogic Finals and to increase its membership base by 40% over the next five years.

Speaking at the Association's National Congress in Kildare President Joan O'Flynn described the goals, which are part of the Association's National Development Plan as 'achievable and realistic' but she stressed it would require all elements of the organisation working in tandem in order to achieve this.

"This is the roadmap for the Association over the next five years. We have a strategy which focuses on participation and growing the game of camogic. For instance, if you look at our current club base we have over 540 clubs and we intend to grow that to over 750 by 2015. The key is to ensure that all elements of the association, full-time team, voluntary committees, provincial councils and county boards get behind this plan and work to achieve the goals that have been set."

Our Game, Our Passion', The Camogie Association National Development Plan 2010-2015 was unveiled to over 150 delegates Saturday afternoon. President of the GAA Christy Cooney also addressed the gathering and highlighted the strong and vibrant working relationship between both associations.

Congress delegates also voted unanimously to adopt the motion proposing the compulsory use of helmets for all players engaged in training and playing. The rule will come into force at the beginning of next year.

The 2011 Congress will take place in Ulster with Belfast the proposed venue for the event.

The 2010 season is almost under way. Will it throw up a new champion? We've had a different champion every year since 2003.
















Leanne Fennelly is a great young talent and she performed brilliantly at centre-back against Galway, stifling the threat of the experienced Therese Maher. However, the participation of the two Lyng's could be in doubt.

Eimear had to be stretchered off following an accidental collision in the League semi-final, while namesake – but no relation – Lizzie has an even bigger day this coming Friday. She is getting married and she is highly unlikely to feature on Saturday.

Strong contention

Deirdre Delaney and Edwina Keane are in strong contention for a starting position along with Collette Dormer, who was superb when introduced at half-time in the semi-final. She went onto score the match winning goal.

Despite scoring ten goals in three games, the Kilkenny forwards have only performed in fits and starts. There is plenty of room for improvement. But it's a good sign that the best is possibly yet to come.

Wexford are a team bristling with experience. Mags Darcy is a solid and dependable goalkeeper. In Catherine O'Loughlin they possess one of the best full-backs in the business. The Lacey sisters Mary at centre-back and Una – double goalscorer against Cork – add strength, skill and a powerful physical presence.

Ashbourne Cup player of the tournament Katriona Parrock, the lively Kate Kelly and the ever-skilful Ursula Jacob will take plenty of watching.

This Kilkenny team is on an upward curve. Young, determined, hungry and willing to succeed, they should be celebrating another League title on Saturday.

Any support for the girls would be welcomed. Admission is free for people under-16. The under-16 team plays their All-Ireland semi-final clash against Tipperary at The Ragg – five miles outside Thurles - at 1pm.

SOMETIMES AN absolute refusal to stop trying; a lungpuncturing, unrelenting effort of monumental proportions is good enough to achieve your goal. However, when two teams cancel each other out in those stakes it takes a moment of sheer class to act as a separator.

And that's almost exactly how the National Camogie League Division 1 final transpired at Semple Stadium on Saturday last, with the only difference being that Wexford produced two moments.

Ordinarily hearts would have dropped when Marie Dargan forced the ball over the goal-line following a prolonged scramble involving upwards of a dozen players a minute and a half into injury time.

Yet this Wexford side is far from ordinary. The raised green flag only served to reinvigorate the troops as Una Leacy ignited to lash over a picture-perfect equaliser 30 seconds later.

As if that wasn't enough - following more frenetic yet asserted defending from the Slaneysiders - they eventually fashioned an opening for the winner.

Ursula Jacob, again starting as a substitute, worked half a yard of space down the right following a flick on from Lenny Holohan and blasted over the winning score as seven and a half minutes of injury ticked up on the gloom-illuminated stadium clock, sparking joyous scenes from the Wexford contingent inside the ground.

Again, like the semi-final victory over Cork, it wasn't always as it was drawn up in J.J. Doyle's notebook.. At times it was downright ugly. But the defence again paved the way for victory as the forwards floundered for long periods.

While the half-back line defended exceptionally well for the second game running, they had prolonged periods of poor ball usage. The midfielders, while dramatically improved from the semi-final win over Cork, were guilty of the same offence.

It's not been costly so far but a continuation of the situation through the championship will eventually tell like it did last year.

The forward line again struggled, partly because of the use of an extra back by Kilkenny, partly because of poor service but also because the confidence in possession is still a little off.





While, this debate is ongoing within Camogie, we are strongly promoting Go Games in our development work.

GAA Congress also considered a motion to introduce match bans as a form of suspension instead of the current system of suspending people for a number of weeks or months. This was referred for further consideration. Within Camogie, our proposed new rules suggest match bans in certain circumstances.

New clubs monitor

One of the best things I've heard over the past couple of weeks is the drive around establishing new clubs around the country. Here's some of what's happening: Ballyvarley in Mayo just started... Arklow Rocks in Wicklow on the go.... Burrin Rangers in Carlow recently launched..... St. Joseph's in Laois getting off the ground St. Bridgets in Rochtfortbrige starting upLongford Slashers taking part in competition. Mungret and Glenrue in Limerick up and running..... discussions in Carnew, Co. Wicklow Castletown in Laois maybe reestablishing and overseas a new club forming in Indianapolis USA.

There sure is plenty of interest and enthusiasm out there for our game. Let's keep spreading the word. If each county can establish one new club this year that'd be at least 28 new clubs by this time next year! That's definitely within our sights. Its more players, more teams, more volunteers, more participation and more fun!

Few teams in any sphere of sport can rival the brilliant record of the C.I.E. camogie teams who swept victoriously across the playing fields of Ireland.

It seems incredible but nevertheless it is true-their senior team were only defeated once between 1945 and 1954. Tom Brady established the G.S.R. Camogie Club in 1931 in order to cater for girls who were interested in playing Camogie. The girls trained after school in the grounds with the boys in a disorganised fashion. The ground on which the Camogie team played was known as the; pend field, This field was originally a water pend, and due to the financial support and good will of the G.S.R. Company the pend was filled in during the

The girts had to buy their own uniforms and Hurley's. The affiliation fees etc, were paid for by the Railway Athletic Union who gave great support and encouragement to the Club. The Uniform colours of the Club were wine tunic, green blouse, and white sash—the Railway

The first Camogle team in 1931 consisted of the following players, Rose Molyneux, [Captain] Kathleen Neville, Agotha Roche, Maureen Farrell, Dolly Byrne, Dolly Behan, Margaret Behan, Claire Nugent, Kitty Murphy, Nora Roche, Kathleen Lanigan, Edith Stack, and Elizen Notan. The team was entered in the Intermediate League and were runners-up in the Celtic Cup. [Cup for winners of the Intermediate League]

For most of the lifetime of the G.S.R. Camogie Club they fielded three teams, junior, intermediate and senior. During the 1940s and 1950s the Club was not alone one of the outstanding Clubs in Dublin but also in the whole of the Country.

In 1945 Dublin and a number of other Counties withdrew from the Ard Chomhairle of the Camogle Association due to a difference that arose at the 1945 Congress. This was also the year that the Comagle team adapted the name C.I.E.

In 1947 the C.I.E. Camogie Club affiliated to the Ard Chomhairle and were therefore elected to represent Dublin in the All Ireland series, they were beaten by Antrim 2-4 to 2-1 in the final that year. In 1948 history was made when gids of the C.I.E. Club representing Dublin beat Down in the All Ireland Senior Camogie final by 11-4 to 4-2.

In 1951 the team excelled themselves, winning the three prized trophies in carnogie, the Isle of Man cup, the Dublin league and the Dublin championship, a feat never before accomplished by any single team in one season.

Naturally members of the team were selected to represent their county in many an All Ireland game. It would be difficult to name a few champions from that galaxy of stars, but Kay Mills was recognised as one of the finest players in the country. Kathleen Mills was born in 31 South Square Inchicore and was rearied in the area. She was educated in the local Convent School at Goldenbridge. Kathleen's father worked in the Inchicore works and therefore Kathleen was able to participate in and avail of the sporting activities in the G.S.R. Athletic Union. Two pence per week were deducted from the worker's wages to go towards the financing of the sports activities in the Railway.

From an early age Kathleen was interested in all kinds of sporting activities and distinguished herself in Gymnastics and running, she won her first Camogie uniform by coming first in a race in the Railway Union annual sports. In 1938 after finishing her education at the age of fourteen years she played her first Camogie match for the G.S.R. Her first match was in the junior ranks and in the next game she was promoted to the senior panel.

Kathleen played senior from then until her retirement from the game of Carmogle in 1961after winning the last of her 15 All Ireland medals. In 1941 at the age of 16 years she played her first senior County match against Cork. At Club level she played her part in helping her club win the senior dub championship in 1942, 1947, 1949, 1951 and 1954, and the senior league in 1946, 1947, 1948, 1950, 1951, 1954, 1958, and 1959.

Kathleen also assisted her County in winning the All Ireland senior Camogle championship in the years 1942 to 1944, 1949 to 1955 and 1957 to 1961, a record 15 All Ireland Senior Medals that no other player in Camogle, hurling or football has equalled or is ever likely to.

nal and go one better. Clonakilty will be hoping to continue to build on the success of last season as they join the ranks of Senior B, while Ballinhassig are a strong side with a huge amount of talent and they will be one of the favourites to emerge from the group. Newcestown and Aghbullogue are

clubs with strong underage structures and they are always championship campaigners and hard to beat. They will not be overawed by any of their opponents and, with plenty of talented players in their line-out, will be strong opposition for all teams in the group. Overall, the Senior B champi-

onship is a wide open affair with all 11 teams evenly matched. It will be interesting to watch each team's progress as the competition unfolds.

15-year-olds try out for Cork development squad

THE death took place on Saturday after a brief illness of Rena O'Leary (née Manley) president of county senior champions St Catherine's.

A former intercounty player with Cork, Rena started her camogle career with St Aloysius School, with whom she won many honours.

She won a junior county in 1956 and three senior county championship medals with Old Aloysius in 1959, '60 and '61. She played senior with Cork

in 1960 and was captain of the Munster Championship winning team in '62. She won Gael Linn medals in 1963 and '64 with Munster.

A native of Whitechurch, Rena moved to take up residence in Conna with her husband Dermot and she was the driving force behind the formation of the St Catherine's, club whom she captained to take the club first major title when they captured the Junior B county title in 1984, a remarkable 28

years after she has won her first county junior championship meal with Old Als in 1956.

When she retired from playing, her enthusiasm for the game continued and she was deeply involved in coaching and training underage teams as well as doing a huge amount of work for the club in her capacity as secretary.

Two years ago Rena was elected to the position of club president.

Always to the fore in all club activities Rena was 'Mrs Camogie' in the parish of Conna and it was a source of great pride to her when St Catherine's captured the senior championship title for the first time last November.

She is survived by her husband Dermot, daughters Brid and Sheila, sons Ted, Paddy, Derry and extended family. Mass and burial takes place on Wed following 2pm mass in Conna, May she rest in peace.

It takes all sorts to make up a successful team; for every vocal player with a fondness for shouting words of encouragement to colleagues, you can be sure to find somebody who prefers to let their stickwork do the

All those familiar with Stacey Redmond will agree that she fits into the latter category. and her outstanding performances in the first half of this year prove that being of a quiet disposition on the field isn't an impediment to success.

It's fair to say that the 20-year-old from Knocknaveigh, The Ballagh, wouldn't have been very well known outside of Wexford and W.I.T. when she joined her team-mates in Cork last February for the Ashbourne weekend.

However, her two brilliant midfield performances attracted widespread attention, so much so that Stacey was selected as a worthy winner of the player of the tournament.

Saturday's semi-final against U.C.C. in the Mardyke had its fair share of anxious moments, particularly in the first-half, but when W.I.T. needed someone to step up to the plate, Stacey was ready, willing and

It was a similar story 24 hours later in Páirc Ui Rinn when the Oulart-The Ballagh starlet continued her successful partnership with Kilkenny's Anne Dalton. Their dominance around the centre was one of the chief factors in ending U.C.D's threein-a-row bid and, speaking as a neutral with no ties to either college, it was hard to credit how both W.I.T. players weren't chosen on the Ashbourne All Stars team.

There was more to come from the 20-yearold who is taking the Early Childhood Studies course. Fittingly, the league and championship double was completed on her home pitch in Oulart on the worst night possible for a game of camogie.

The rainfall lashed down from start to finish and it was thoroughly miserable for the dedicated few huddling under the floodlights. And while W.I.T. didn't seem to be in a great position at the break, Stacey and her colleagues played with the confidence that comes from being winners and eventually edged a tight contest by one

Camogie followers in Wexford knew that Stacey had what it takes to make the grade from her Under-12 debut. That sublime skill was there from the off, and it remains to this day as Stacey's clever wristwork makes her a joy to watch when in full flight.

How often have you seen several players huddled over a ball on the ground, only for Stacey to sweep away with possession and get in a snappy delivery? She's been doing it successfully in the red and black of Oulart-The Ballagh, the purple and gold of Wexford, and the white and blue of W.I.T., and the good news is that there's a lot more to come because her camogie career is still



Success came to Stacey at an early stage, as she won a fabulous four All-Ireland Féile na nGael Division 1 titles in a row with her club and also captained Wexford to the Leinster Under-14 championship in 2002.

A provincial Under-16 title was added in that same year, and she was also a key figure in a truly golden era for Coláiste Bríde (Enniscorthy). Four All-Ireland medals came her way, a Senior hat-trick from 2003 to 2005 plus a Junior title in the never to be forgotten double year of 2004.

She has probably lost track of the number of under-age county medals won with Oulart-The Ballagh as they were simply unstoppable coming up through the ranks. And they carried this on to the Senior grade, with Stacey holding five county titles in a row from 2003 to 2007 plus an All-Ireland sevens crown from 2006.

2007 was a year she won't forget in a hurry. winning an All-Ireland Senior medal as a Wexford substitute just three months after completing her Leaving Cert. And after a barren 2008 when the mental and physical exertions of that achievement took its toll on everyone, the signs are that the appetite has returned.

Stacey had a great day in Parnell Park on the last Saturday in April, playing at right half-forward on the Wexford Intermediate team which beat Antrim to clinch a firstever National League Division 2 title, and immediately adding a Division 1 medal as a substitute with the Seniors who accounted for Tipperary.

A versatile performer, Stacey tends to shine whether she is positioned at midfield or in a wing-back or wing-forward role. And she's not the only Redmond family member attracting attention, as her older brother, David, has firmly established himself on the Wexford Senior hurling team since making his debut early in 2008, alternating for the most part between midfield and the fullforward line.

Keep a close eye out for Stacey if you happen to attend a W.I.T. or Wexford game in the near future, but be warned - while you won't hear her on the field, those silken skills will be guaranteed to catch your eye!

The Path to Ashbourne Glory 1998 - 2009 by Jacqui O'Connor

Patience is a virtue and success comes to those who wait and these phrases epitomises the WIT Camogie clubs 10-year Ashbourne Cup history. One could say it could be both one of admiration for the three Ashbourne titles won and one of contempt for the ones they failed to secure.

WIT's Ashbourne camogie trail began in 1998, where they reached the Ashbourne Cup final against UCC only for heartbreak to ensue with the last puck of the game sending WIT into disarray and UCC into exhibitation. However this was to be the driving force behind the two-year success story that was to follow. The 1999 campaign brought with it a fresh horde of first years, who were astonished with the sincere passion and drive worn on the sleeves of the girls whose Ashbourne dreams of 1998 was crushed. In the semi final stages WIT faced a strong physical NUIG outfit. WIT fought hard and their unerring fighting attitude paved the way to their second Ashbourne cup final in two years. The memories of '98 still etched in the faces of the stalwarts who braved the pitch that day, resulted in WIT's empathic win over UCC. The celebrations, which followed, along with the stories told will live long in the memory of the Ashbourne cup panel of '99.

The 2000/2001 season was one of misfortune having lost a number of key players, nevertheless WIT was still instantly seen as being strong contenders. Unfortunately an element of contempt set in the camp and WTT regretfully bowed out of the competition of the semi-final stages against UCD. 2001 brought with it a rejuvenated approach however a defeat in the league campaign, which saw WIT, overpowered by a 19 points defeat by UCC, this marked the start of an incredible journey. It was evident from the degrading defeat that nothing would be taken for granted with players showing their alliance and dedication, sheer hard work and camaraderie to achieve what many presumed the unachievable. WIT faced undoubtedly a highly fancied UCC team in the semi-final stages. A battle was to follow where each WIT player took centre stage where they stood up and were counted resulting in a remarkable team performance. Conversely a tougher test followed with UL waiting the in the wings having had an easy path to the final. It was a fairy-tale match where WIT trailed by seven points with five minutes remaining and UL undoubtedly having one hand on the cup. Unbelievably WIT scored two goals and two points in the dying stages and victory was snatched. WIT were duly crowned Ashbourne Cup Champions for the second time in three years.

A famine then blighted the WTT camogic team from 2001 to 2007 where they never reached their full potential having the players was not alone the key ingredient but it was that element of luck that failed to shine. 2008 saw their level of disappointment beginning to take a u-turn where they reached the Ashbourne Cup final only for their path to glory being sabotaged by an experienced UCD contingent. However it was UCD that felt the wrath of WTT's long absence from Ashbourne glory and when in 2009 they disposed of UCC in the semi-final all that stood in their way were their old rivals UCD. Being beaten once would have been tolerable but to be beaten twice in two years was inconceivable. WTT brought with them an element of play that secured WTT their first Ashbourne title in '99, which was sheer heart, passion and camaraderie. All of which have been passed down through the years in not alone camogie but all codes of the club and will continue to do so in the future. WTT fought tirelessly and were given their due rewards when the final whistle blew and WTT secured their third Ashbourne title after an absence of eight years.

It must be said that this success would not have unfolded but for the work behind the scenes of the GAA club. When it all began in 1981 each and every player gone through its doors have witnessed the professionalism given to each code, the standard that were set and the pure and utter pride that the club had and still has to offer speaks in it self. This club is the reason that the college is to the fore of third level GAA. Not only serving as an ambassador to the players who wear the blue white and red and also the college as a whole. This club knows the value of its members and it's these values that have brought the club to the highest level.

Camogie in WIT is on the rise once again and hopefully it will continue to do so in the foreseeable future. Ten years have gone by extremely

quickly but in the space of these years, three Ashbourne titles and three league titles have been secured. Undoubtedly it is not alone the materialistic elements that these players treasure but the memories that were had, life long friendships that were made and predominantly the philosophy of WIT GAA club which has continued to strive in each individual long after their college playing days have elapsed.

Of the 30 players on the panel 13 came from Kilkenny., 6 from Wexford, 4 from Waterford, 3 from Tipperary and one each from Galway, Limerick, Offaly and Cork. The team was captained by Keeva Fennelly (Kilkenny) and managed by Helena Jacob, James Meagher, Ger Kinane and Conor Phelan

The final, on 22nd February was an exciting though tense affair. W.I.T. were determined to obliterate the memory of the defeat in 2008 while U.C.D. were intent on completing the 3-in-a-row. W.I.T. dominated the first half and scored 1 goal 6 points to 1 point for U.C.D. The opposition, though wind-

assisted in the second half, could not match W.I.T.'s intensity and power and were forced to relinquish their crown and ambition.

Stacey Redmond had the privilege of being named as the Most Valuable Player of the Tournament while she joined team-mates Therese Shortt, Colette Dormer and Ursula Jacob on the Ashbourne All-Stars 2009.

Ashbourne 09 was an unforgettable oddyssy for everyone involved. Lasting friendships were forged, skills were improved and perfected, character was tested and proved and immense fun was had by all. The wonderful camogie year came to a glorious end in Oulart when, some weeks later, W.I.T. re-affirmed their superiority by defeating U.C.D in the Ashbourne League Final and finished the year undefeated.

CORK Camogie are building for the future as they organis-ing their first development squads — 130 young camogie players of 15 years of age at-tended for the initial trial in their bid to make it onto the

This is the first time that the county board have organised the development squad for the aged 15 bracket, last season Cork were part of the Coillte under 14 development programme and following on the success of this venture plans were unveiled at county convention to get things up and running. Play-ers who are under 15 this year and not currently members of the county under 16 squad were been nominated by their clubs and they were been divided into groups with approximately 36 players in each session, they went through their paces under the watchful eye of former intercounty players as four one hour sessions took place. The 36 players were divided into four teams of nine and each session consisted of a warm up, some drills and three 10-minute games played across the pitch with two

games on at the same time.

A second trial will be held on Sunday, May 16, after which two panels of 20 players will be selected and over the next six to eight weeks the players chosen will attend training and coaching sessions with a Munster blitz to be held on Saturday, July 17, in Cahir.

> "It's all go, believe me... and we cater for all sports from field sports to watersports to martial arts to the great outdoors.

> "We also handle the athletic track bookings from clubs and schools and it's packed every evening with the local clubs," said Miriam when we met

On top of all that, she works on bookings for the sports hall, pitches, studio room, the elite gym and the tennis

We have a lot of the county teams using the facilities from ladies football to the camogie team to the Cork minor hurlers and footballers - they all train here on site," she added.

Sporting circles mourn priest's passing

EAST Clare parishioners and the sporting world were joined in mourning this week following the death of Fr Liam Murray, retired parish priest of Mountshannon, who gave fifty years service to camogie.

Fr Liam died last Thursday at his home in Killuran, O'Callaghan's Mills. He served as priest of the Killaloe Diocese for 58 years.

A native of O'Callaghan's Mills, Fr Liam was born in 1926. He studied for the priesthood at St Patrick's College, Maynooth, where he was ordained in 1952.

After ordination he served on the emigrant apostolate in the Diocese of Brentwood for four years before

returning to become Curate in Killanena in 1956. He was appointed curate in Whitegate in 1960 and in Castleconnell, County Limerick, in 1965. He served there until 1969 when he was appointed curate in Cloughjordan, County Tipperary. He was appointed parish priest of Coolmeen/Cranny in 1986 and moved to Mountshannon/Whitegate as parish priest in 1989, where he served until he retired in 1998. He remained as assistant pastor in Mountshannon until his death.

In his younger days, Fr Liam Murray played hurling for O'Callaghan's Mills and St Flannan's. In 1957 he revived the ailing hurling club in Killanena, but it was in 1959 that he initiated his outstanding association with camogie by founding a new club in that parish.

He had perceived a need for some form of recreation and social activity for the young girls of the area. He was elected club chairman and he also trained the team which went on to win the Clare Senior Championship and League double in its first

In 1960, he was elected to the chair of Clare Camogie Board, as well as taking charge of the preparation of the county senior camogie team.

He continued as chairman of the Killanena club and trained the team to their second senior double in this year also. Killanena went on to win a total of eight senior titles in a row and the club that Fr Liam founded supplied the majority of the players to the Clare team during that period.

In 1960, he took over the Whitegate senior hurling team and led them to a memorable senior championship victory in 1961.

During 1962 Fr Murray was chairman of Whitegate hurling club and St Mary's camogie club. He was also chairman of the Clare Camogie Board and Whitegate Athletics Club, while he continued as trainer to St Mary's camogie team, Whitegate hurlers and the Clare camogie team. In addition, he served as a selector of the Clare senior hurling team and was also elected vice-president of Clare NACA.

At the time of his death he was president of the Clare Camogie Board.

velopment squad here and I was directly involved in that myself. We have the Cork Kennedy Cup team in soccer and the Cork GAA development squads,"-said Miriam, who hails from the picturesque town of Kilbrittain in West Cork.

Originally Miriam was one of three full-time sports officers on campus but two full-timers have left the office and due to a staffing embargo they have not been replaced.

"I am joined in the office by Acting Sports Officer Mia O'Leary and then we have Aoife Kelleher on the admin side doing sport and societies and between the three of us we keep the office in full swing.

"On the GAA side, we have Keith Ricken and on the soccer side for the first time this year, we have a part-time officer in Eric Marah."

Cork IT has a student population of 5,500 to 6,000 and, as Miriam rightly says: "It's non-stop, day and night and it's a city in itself when you come in off the main road."

Cork IT and, more specifically, the sports administration office, is catering for 38 clubs on campus from martial arts to water sports like sailing, kayaking and sub aqua to canoeing.

They have basketball, boxing and badminton and basically cater for a huge range of sports.

"A lot of people would come into college and some of them would never have played sport before and we have to cater for that too. It's a great opportunity for students to take up a new sport and to even try their hand at a couple of different sports."

This year Cork IT presented 84 sports scholarships across a wide range of sports. FIVE TIME All-Ireland winner and qualified camogie tutor, MIRIAM DEASY brings the same zest and enthusiasm to her job as Sports Officer at Cork Institute of Technology.

She took time out of her busy schedule to talk on campus to the Evening Echo's NOEL SPILLANE.

"We have hosted a lot of cross-country events this year with the South Munster schools, the Munster schools and the All-Ireland series. It's the first time ever the All-Irelands were held in Cork and that's been great for Cork IT as a sports facility.

"We had the course here on campus right around the pitches and we also had the inter-varsity cross-country and the Umbro Cup soccer."

Irish ladies boss Noel King and his squad used the facilities during the year and also on the horizon are the Cork City sports this summer.

Miriam says the college has come a long way in terms of development and infrastructure since she was a student and rates Cork IT alongside UCC at this stage.

"We have come a long, long way from the days when I was a student here. We had very few clubs and we had one pitch that catered for everybody but look at it now," said Miriam as she surveyed the scene from upstairs at the main stadium. The next stage in the on-going development of Cork IT as an ultra-modern sports facility catering for all is the erection of more flood lights on the soccer pitches and the provision of a new sports hall as the existing indoor facility has reached over-capacity.

"When I was here as a student I played soccer, ladies football and camogie and I was very involved at the time in setting up the camogie club from scratch.

"There was no camogie team here when I arrived but it's thriving now. Myself and Cliona Meaney (who played with Inniscarra) got the ball rolling in that sense.

"When you have a desire and a love of a particular sport, and in my case camogie, you want to see other people enjoying it and I was determined to get that project off the ground," said Miriam who helped with the hosting of the Ashbourne and Purcell Cup finals.

"We combined them here. It was nice to have it here and it was the first time that the two have been played over the same weekend.

"It was a great carnival of camogie here in February. It worked out really well and there was a great atmosphere around the place," said Miriam who won six All-Ireland medals with Cork.

"The job is very much administration at this stage and, perhaps, that's a downside to it.

"There's not a whole lot of time to get out and enjoy the games these days as much as we would.

"There's a lot of paper work, office and accounts, email's, bookings and so on.

"We do all the bill paying and accounts for the clubs and that's a mammoth task.

"When I started out here, I was training the camogie club and the soccer club and I even took a Freshers' hurling session when we had no GAA officer.

"But the chances of getting out now to train a team is zero because of the work load.

"During the academic term, it's full whack, full steam ahead and very, very busy and you just have to put in the hours," she told me

put in the hours," she told me.

Miriam comes from a family of five brothers who are all hurling and football mad.

"I had some fantastic years in the camogie and I was lucky enough to have won six county medals with my home club and each one is as precious as the other and I suppose I was lucky to have won Munster medals at every level.

"I have five All-Irelands with Cork, three senior "A" medals, one junior medal and one senior "B" which I captained in 2006 - so I retired on September 30, 2006 - very happy below in the Gaelic Grounds in Limerick after captaining the senior 'B' team and it was a sweet way for me to end my camogie career."

But Miriam's passion and desire for the game she loves continues in her home where she now coaches the kids and runs an annual Camogie summer camp.

"I am still sticking in there with the club but we are going through a bit of a lean period in a way.

"I train and coach some of the underage teams now and this will be my third year running a summer camp.

"I take a week off work and go back home and do it for a week just to give something back to the club and the sport.

"I cater for girls from 6-14, we have a great week and it's a chance for the girls to meet some of their Cork and senior club heroines!

"They get a great buzz out of it and I just feel it's a chance for me to give something back as well."


"Each of the under-age teams would want you to coach them but it's physically impossible so I see my camp as an opportunity to get in touch with them all.

"I coached the Cork U-14 development squad last year and I am looking forward to coaching the U-15 girls this year.

"I have coached here at Cork IT for years, with the highlight being the winning of the Purcell Cup in 2001 and gaining promotion to the Ashbourne for the first time ever.

"I also coached the Cork juniors to a national league title as well.

"I enjoy it and now that I see the big "R" of retirement looming, I have become a Camogie tutor with Coaching Ireland," she added.



EMERGING FROM THE SHADOWS

After losing a clutch of key players, Cork must unearth some new stars to bolster their bid for three-in-a-row

THE All-Ireland championship has undergone a revamp this year, with teams playing seven round-robin games ahead of the knock-out stages.

The new format will be taxing, and strength in depth is the key for All-Ireland success.

Champions Cork find themselves in uncharted waters, bereft of the talents of key players - Briege Corkery has taken some time off to travel, and Una O'Donoghue and Sarah Hayes have retired.

At present Emer Dillon and Emer Farrell are not training with the panel but it is anticipated that Farrell will return, while the door also remains open for Dillon.

A lacklustre league campaign and a defeat to Tipperary in the Munster championship will have left manager Denise Cronin with plenty to mull over before they begin the defence of their crown against last year's All-Ireland finalists Kilkenny.

If they are to retain their title and fulfil their ambition of three-in a row, Gemma O'Connor, Rachel Moloney, Orla Cotter, Mary O'Connor and Caitriona Foley will need to play big parts.

Having captured the League title in breathtaking fashion last weekend against Kilkenny, Wexford now turn their attention to championship.

Wexford are widely fancied to reach the final, but manager JJ Doyle will be well aware that League form does not necessarily transfer to the Championship.

The Leacy sisters, Una and Mary, along with keeper Mags D'Arcy and attackers Ursula Jacob and Katrina Parrock are vital for success. The Model County are one of the teams who have the strength in depth to adapt to the new format.

The dark horses are Tipperary. An excellent display against Cork in the first round of the Munster championship was a positive indication of the re-emergence of one of camogie's sleeping giants.

While manager Eoin Brislane must plan without the considerable talents of Emer McDonnell, Emily Hayden and Paula Bulfin, he retains a strong cohort of talent, including a number from All-Ireland winning club champions Cashel.

With captain Jill Horan, Cora Hennessy, Clare Grogan and Tricia O'Halloran hurling well, the Premier County are worth watching.

Buoyed by an outstanding conveyorbelt of under-age talent and a number of experienced players, Galway will be anxious to atone for last year's heartbreaking All-Ireland semi-final defeat and go one step further.

They are fortunate that they possess a potent mix of talent, experience and youth; however, they have failed to fulfil their potential on the big stage.

Defeated in '08 and pipped in the semi-final of '09, they also suffered a recent National League semi-final defeat to Kilkenny. The Tribeswomen will be acutely aware that they need to secure silverware sooner rather than later.

Kilkenny will have learned from their All-Ireland defeat of '09 plus their recent National League final defeat to Wexford.

Ann Downey is managing one of the youngest teams in the championship and how they adapt to the rigours of this year's format will be telling.

Kilkenny possess talent in abundance with All Star Ann Dalton captaining the side, Edwina Keane, Katie Power, Jacqui Frisby, Eimear Lyng and Leann Fennelly all playing integral roles.

Last year's defeat will be one of their primary motivators and nothing less than an All-Ireland this year will suffice.

Junior champions in 2008, Clare competed admirably in last year's All-Ireland series, but lack the depth in talent of their main rivals.

The opportunity to compete in this year's round-robin series will only serve to improve the fortunes of the Banner County who will hope to build on the tremendous under-age success they have enjoyed of late.

Dublin have invested significantly in under-age structures across the capital and boast enormous success at both U-14 and U-16 level. At present, the fortunes of their senior team have waned, despite the vibrant adult club scene.

Like Clare, they will be hoping to garner as much experience as possible from this year's Championship and build on their impressive under-age foundation.

In the Intermediate Championship, all eyes will be on Joachim Kelly's Offaly side, who are hotly tipped for the crown.

Their recent National League Division 2 final defeat to Wexford will have provided them with plenty of lessons.

Up north, Derry have been working away quietly and are the dark horses for the Intermediate title.


Limerick, boosted by a good League campaign, will fancy their chances and the odds look good for them to make the finals.

Death of former Mountshannon parish priest

THE communities of Mountshannon, Whitegate and O'Callaghan's Mills were saddened this week following the death of the Very Reverand Liam Murray, retired parish priest of Mountshannon.

Fr Liam died at his home in Killuran, O'Callaghan's Mills, on May 6. He served as priest of the Killaloe diocese for 58 years. A native of O'Callaghan's Mills, where he was born in 1926, Fr Liam went on to study for the priesthood at St Patrick's College, Maynooth, where he was ordained in 1952.

After ordination, he served on the Emigrant Apostolate in the Diocese of Brentwood in England for four years before returning to become curate in Killanena in 1956. He was appointed curate in Whitegate in 1960 and went on to Castleconnell in County Limerick, serving as a curate there from 1965 until 1969, when he was appointed curate in Cloughjordan, County Tipperary. He was later appointed parish priest of Coolmeen/Cranny in County Clare in 1986 before moving to Mountshannon/Whitegate in 1989, where he served as parish priest until he retired in 1998. He remained on as assistant pastor in Mountshannon until his death. During his time in the parish of Killanena, Fr Murray established the Killanena Camogie Club and current chairperson of the club Kathleen McNamara said, Fr Murray "was very popular and left a lasting imprint on the life of the parish".

"He loved farming, folklore, poetry and storytelling and will be always remembered with fondness in Killanena. One of his enduring legacies was the setting up of Killanena

Camogie Club in 1959 and he won two senior championships immediately as team trainer. The team went on to win six additional senior titles in-a-row. The Killanena club celebrated his 50 years of camogie involvement last year by unveiling a plaque in his honour at the club-house. The club presented the Clare Camogie Board with a new cup in his name, which will be awarded to the champions in the intermediate grade from this year onwards," she said.

Fr Murray also enjoyed recalling stories from the early years of the club and according to Ms McNamara "was inspirational in providing material for the club's history, which was launched in 2004".

A large number of locals attended his funeral in Whitegate at St Flannan's Church last Sunday and he was laid to rest in the church grounds.



At the moment people are doubting Cork, but I have every faith that the spirit and determination we always show will continue to be shown by our teams, and I wish Cork well in their bid for three in a row".

Tipperary were always on the border in the middle/late 90s but could never make the breakthrough. They got it when Cork threw away an semi-final All-Ireland against Kilkenny in 1999. Tipp defeated Galway in their semi and Kilkenny by a point in the final.

And so began a period of dominance for three years. Recalling those memories

Deirdre responds: "I had a ball! I absolutely ate, drank and slept camobut loved every minute. We lost a lot more than we won initially, but in fairness those All-Irelands

were some bonus. "It was great to see the development of the game, the training, the way it got so professional and organised,

as well as going to 15-a-side. I was really spoilt 12-a-side as it was made for a full-forward... but there was more team work and tactics introduced with the 15-a-side."

Camogie became 15-a-side in 1999 and I believe, tactically. Tipp got the hang of it quicker than Cork.

Tipp have taken a step back in recent years. What's Deirdre's outlook on that, particularly considering Cashel are so strong?

"It's hard to call. It's a mixture. I suppose the three main things we would all say exist in either a good team or bad team set-up would be management, county board and players, so I guess you need the three. Club wins never tend to reflect county teams. I think with Tipp also, five of us retired together and that was a

"We were lucky with management I would say. We were always handy enough but the boys (Michael Cleary and then Raymie Ryan) just added that extra dimension. They were so professional and had so much respect."

Does she miss the game?

"I did in the beginning, especially when the summer comes and the ground gets hard and the championship starts but now not so much as you realise you can do other things."

Deirdre swims five mornings a week, plays golf and cycles. Plus she says, 'it's great to go on holidays'.

The Glen had some tremendous battles with Toomevara. One game particularly stands out when the mother of all battles took place in Toom's backyard and they ran us to three points. We were lucky to

come away with that one. Toomevara eventually got revenge in the Glen Field in 95 and it's a victory Deirdre recalls only too well.

"It was better than winning an all Ireland. I think we blew the horns through every town and village on the way home and it was only the first round of the Munster championship."

I've got great memories of many meetings between the two clubs and later against Tipp. Deirdre was always there. The youngest player honoured on the Team of the Century in 2004 she was everything a full-forward should be.

It's only when you retire that you appreciate the innings you had, the friends you made and the memories that are etched forever.

Now what did Deirdre say about a reunion?

Camogie president seeks long term Féile benefit a camogie point of view it's

Association CAMOGIE president Joan O'Flynn believes that the benefit to Clare of hosting Féile will be manifold and not just on the camogie, hurling or handball front:

The Kildare-based Cork woman, who is in her second year as national president, maintains that Clare will receive a significant economic boost next month, when up to 5,000 visitors come to the county for Féile weekend (June 18 to 20).

"You've over 3,000 children participating in the parade and hundreds of families and supporters coming to visit Clare for a couple of days. So it's a big shot in the arm for the local services sector in particular. It's important to say that as well because sometimes the economic contribution of sport gets a lit-tle bit overlooked," O'Flynn told The Clare Champion this

Economics aside the Féile focus will be on what happens between the white lines. This week Joan O'Flynn was part of a combined GAA and camogie troupe that visited 70 Clare primary schools to market the arrival of Féile in the county.

A civil servant in the social inclusion division of the Department of Community, Equality and Gaeltacht Affairs, Joan O'Flynn is hugely appreciative of the contribution primary school

teachers make to the development of camogie.

"In all the classrooms the colour was brilliant. All the kids were wearing the club jersey or the Clare jersey and some kids were wearing other counties jerseys as well. But the dominant colours were the Clare and the club colours," she said.

"Lots of kids had done artwork and lots of performance. You'd be very motivated and very energised by the commitment of the teachers to maintaining the culture and making it stronger. That includes the games but also the music and the language, which we heard plenty of as well. It wouldn't be Clare without lots of Irish music and we heard lots of that," O'Flynn added.

Camogie players Deirdre Murphy and Fiona Lafferty accompanied the camogie president as did hurlers Cormac O'Donovan and Colin

Those friendships continue long after Féile," she said.

"It really energises a club to be either competing to qualify for Féile and then equally if you are hosting it to put the best side of your club out for the weekend. It tends to bring in a lot of parents as well who may have had a peripheral involvement before. It brings them into the club because there's loads of jobs to be done when Féile comes to visit," O'Flynn pointed

She acknowledged though that Féile could be the last seen of some players if their interest

"Sometimes there's maybe a slight risk that it can become the climax of an under age players' ca-reer. It's a step along

journey really in terms of a players development is what I would say. Part of the leg-acy of it should be that kids maintain their enthusiasm for the game."

On a broader note part of the Camogie Association's 2010-2015 development plan, entitled Our Game, Our Passion, is to help the sport to develop internationally.

Having lived and worked in London for a decade, Joan O'Flynn is very keen to advance this element of the organisations strategic plan.

"I spent ten years in Lon-"I spent ten years in London so I'd be quite keen about supporting the development of camogie overseas. The geography of trying to develop the game in a place like London or New York is very difficult," she said.

Whether it is in Clare, across Ireland or overseas, O'Flynn wants to significantly increase playing numbers. There are 800,000 girls under 20 in Ireland in 2010 and 391,000 aged five to 15.

Only a fraction of them play competitive sport however, and a fraction of that figure play camogie.

"One of the things that drives me is the fact that women are underrepresented in sport. Thousands of girls tog out for camogie every weekend. But that's only a fraction of the number of young people who play sport. There's far more boys tog-ging out," she noted.

Next month more than 1,000 girls will hurl their hearts out for the weekend in Clare. If Joan O'Flynn's vision comes to fruition Féile will represent the start and not the highlight of their camogie careers.

Feile Na nGael gets under way on Friday June 18 with the finals taking place on Sunday June 20.


Trials whittle U15 squad down to 43

Chasing pack are closing on Rebels

WHILE inter-provincial results in no way reflect the strength of individual counties, I couldn't help wondering after I heard the result last weekend between Leinster and Munster if it was a reflection on a slight swing of the pendulum.

Cork are still the strongest county. They have to be, having won four All-Irelands in five years, yet the gap between them and the rest is narrowing.

They will still be in the All-Ireland semi-final come August 14. Cork, Tipp and Clare represented the bulk of Munster and combined they aren't a match for a Leinster dominated by Wexford and Kilkenny.

The concern is Cork's lack of underage success in recent years, having last won an All-Ireland Minor title in 2003 when the grade was U16.

Now with an All-Ireland championship continuing at U16 and the minor championship sitting at U18 it is keeping strong U16 counties together for another two years and that is great for the game, and particularly lucrative for Kilkenny at present, having won four U16 titles in a row between 2005 and 2008.

The minor grade became U18 in 2006 and Kilkenny have won all four titles to date.



But Cork are addressing the issue and with the Cork Colleges U14 competition, aided by the recent 'School of Excellence' for 15 year-olds, are is working towards the national development strategy and the future of Cork camogie.

With just three weeks left to championship throw-in with an away game to Tipperary (wouldn't it have been great if the Cork v Tipp Camogie game could have been played as a curtain-raiser to the hurling on May 30th?) Cork have their heads down and are working hard behind the scenes.

They are lacking in numbers, however, for good quality matches between them with players either up the country with work or college, Leaving Cert exams looming and injuries.

There are a number of girls sitting their Leaving Cert exams in June, namely Katrina and Pamela Mackey and Julia White.

With senior inter-county camogie panels becoming younger than ever almost every county now has secondary school students in their squads.

I can't understand the reasoning the battle will realistically only be

behind commencing this year's championship on June 12 with the Leaving Cert exams starting in and around the same time.

The Mackeys and Julia are unavailable for Cork's opening game and may well be unavailable for their second outing on June 19, at home to Kilkenny.

I can't comprehend either the reasoning behind forcing teams to play six championship matches in seven weeks.

Look at the amount of national league games the Cork hurlers had and they welcomed them with open arms.

That is the time to bombard teams with matches, not during championship.

Cork got just two league games back in March before advancing to a league semi-final where they were defeated by Wexford in early April.

It seemed they had only started playing when they stopped again. Nothing then for two months until all counties are thrown into an

abyss of games.

Cork's bench is somewhat depleted this year after the loss of

pleted this year after the loss of Breige Corkery, Sarah Hayes, Una O'Donoghue and Emer Farrell. A spat of injuries in any game

A spat of injuries in any game will leave them in a difficult situation.

However, with four teams advancing from the seven participants, the battle will realistically only be between five.

Clare and Dublin won't make the semi-finals. If I was to pick the other county not to make it, it would have to be Tipperary.

Despite defeating Cork in the Munster semi-final and giving them a good run in the league, come championship time Tipp hayen't the strength in depth to win the All-Ireland.

They have made significant improvement under the guidance of Eoin Brislane and show a greater enthusiasm of late, but I don't think it's enough.

The loss of Una O'Dwyer and Emer McDonnell was a big blow to a county already struggling for a strong starting 15.

Tipp may take a game or two during the round-robin series and may force a play-off situation, but my money is on Cork, Kilkenny, Wexford and Galway to make it

And then the fun begins.


Joanne O'Callaghan received a hairline fracture of the elbow and has been out for a few weeks.

E-voting Special Congress sees revision of the rules

A SPECIAL CONGRESS was held on May 22 to formally adopt a draft revision of the Camogie Association's rules.

E-voting was used for the first time to vote on the Constitution.

The experiment was a great success with nearly 98% of recommendations passed.

"Rules governing suspensions were referred to Ard Chomhairle after a 50:50 split.

"Some of the motions will come into effect on June 22 (one month after Congress), while others will be effective from 2011."

Some of the changes include:

- Amending the name from Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael to Cumann Camógaíochta or the Camogie Association (from June 2010).
- Agreement to liaise and co-operate with other Gaelic Games bodies (from June 2010).
- Adopting age bands for under age Camogie including that players must be over 15 for adult club Camogie and over 16 for inter-county adult competition (from 2011).
- Adopting child centred, small sided games that focus on skills development for all U12 games activities (from 2011).
- Proposals to introduce (in 2011) match bans as suspensions instead of time bans resulted in a



50:50 vote and Central Council will now consider this further.

Forty-five proposals were considered and 43 passed with strong consensus.

There are many other rules.
I haven't read the rule book yet,
but I'm aware of many and there
are some which will directly affect

the player and club namely:

The compulsory use of facial helmets from January next for all players at all levels.

Despite the fact that I never wore a helmet as I found them too claustrophic, I think this is 100% right.

I wish such a rule was in force when I was playing — it would have saved me a fortune on dental care.

Helmets today aren't as much of an encumbrance as they used to

They are light, immobile and don't impair your vision.

 U12 competitions will be scrapped with a new 'Go Games' strategy.

All counties will ensure that games at U12 level and younger will be organised on the basis of a 'Go Games' model which sees

teams devised on an 11-a-side basis with all participants involved in a full game.

It is based on the idea that it will help to attract young girls to the sport and a message of how participation is valued ahead of competitiveness at this particular age category.

It is felt that it will also contribute to further enhancing the skill level of camogie in the long term as children will have the opportunity to concentrate on this aspect of the game at a formative stage.

What will affect clubs greatly is that no 14 or 15 year-old is allowed to play adult club competition meaning they must be 16 years of age before doing so.

This will cause huge problems for many clubs particularly in rural areas, but I have to agree with the decision.

Physically, it's not right for a 14 or 15 year-old girl to be lining out against an adult in their middle to

It's not right in hurling or football either. I would actually like to see this rule expanded upon.

Too many times I have seen good underage players called upon to play at a level three and four years their senior.

And it's not just happening in camogie. My own nephew at the age of 10 was on his club's U14 hurling and football panel.

At the age of 12 he was on the U16 panels.

His parents disagreed with it and only gave in because of pressure and the fact that he was playing in goal and felt he may not come to as much harm than if he was playing outfield.

What do you do when your child is begging you to play?

However, playing at U12, U14 and U16 in both hurling and football had the poor lad exhausted most nights of the week.

Yet, he idolises the game and wouldn't dream of missing a training session or a match.

Girls are the same. Any handy camogie player is called upon to play at whatever grade they can.

I believe the limit should extend to two years above their own age group only i.e. a 12 year-old can also play U14, but can't play U16 and a 14 year-old can play their own grade plus U16 but it stops there.

I totally understand clubs annoyance at this, but these are children, not machines.

Off the playing field I also wouldn't be particularly happy with a 12 or 14 year-old sitting in the same dressing room as a 16 or 18 year-old, whether it's male or female.

The talk is different and I'll leave it at that.

I've no doubt there will be many debates in the weeks ahead.

Cork U15 development squads are beginning to take shape

IT'S ALL systems go for the Cork U15 development squads as the selectors announced the names of the 42 players chosen from the recent trials held over two weekends.

In total over 100 players aged 15 attended and were put through vigorous sessions of drills and exercises under the watchful eyes of former inter-county players and mentors who assessed every player before coming together to make the final decision on the panels that were chosen.

With the announcement of the panel each player has been given a detailed programme which they will now participate in under the guidance of former senior inter-county players Miriam Deasy, Liz O'Neill, Nora Ahern and former manger to the Cork division two team Aidan Crowley.

The panel will prepare for the Munster Development blitz day which will take place in on July 17 in Cahir.

Margaret Hyde from Fr O'Neill's has been appointed co-coordinator for the panel.

Last year for the first time Cork as a county began organising development squads when they successfully participated in the Coillte Development programme at U14 level and following this, the county board set about establishing development squads.

At last year's convention, Fiona O'Driscoll presented a detailed proposal of how the county could progress with organising development squads, the idea was to get it up and running this year at U15 level while next season its proposed to organise an U13 A squad.

A committee was then put in place to put the proposal into action and Fiona O'Driscoll, Mick O'Regan and Miriam Deasy in liaison with county chairperson Marion McCarthy and juvenile chairman Tracy Sheehan got to work organising the trials, a huge amount of work was put in to get everything organised and now their plan is about to be put into operation.

The squad will meet today for the first session in Castle Road at 11am and they will continue as follows, Tuesday June 8, 15, 22 and 29 and July 6 and 13. The panels are as follows: Jessica Hennigan (Ballincollig), (Ballinhassig). President's Blog May 2010

Glorious sunshine all last week. Twenty primary schools visited in Co. Clare. County and club jerseys everywhere. Loads of artwork, songs, dance and music. Huge commitment by the teachers and local clubs. What am I on about? Féile of course!

The annual promotional visits to schools in the host county were a huge success. 75 schools visited in total. Local Camogie stars included Deirdre Murphy, Fiona Lafferty and Kate Lynch.

The O'Duffy Cup was on the circuit as well compliments of Cork players Mary O'Connor and Jenny Duffy. Our Ardstiurthoir Sinead O'Connor, Caroline Murray Regional Development Officer, Catherine Neary Camogie representative on the National Feile Committee and Mary Hogan, Clare

County Secretary all joined us as well. Earlier in the month I also saw the positive impact of Féile when I watched the Division 3 Dublin Féile semi finals hosted for the first time by Cuala Camogie. The red and white South siders were also participating in Féile for the first time. Great to see Iar Ard Stiuúthóir Sheila Wallace active on the sideline along with another Cuala stalwart Maire Ni Scolai.

New Murn and Me Coaching Programme

While down in the Mid-West, I also took the opportunity to see first hand some of the action from the new Mum and Me Programme. This was designed by Eddie O'Sullivan Limerick Institute of Technology GAA Office with support from Camogie Development Officer Deirdre Murphy and piloted in Eddie's home club Blackrock in Limerick.

The Programme supports mothers to help out with underage coaching and introduces them to the basic skills of the game. Mothers are taught the key coaching points of 7 basic skills of camogie and how to practice these with their daughter. Great innovation that I'm sure will certainly interest clubs all over the country.

New Rule Book

I know the rule book may not be everybody's bedtime reading but it is our Constitution and it guides and directs the Association.

Congress is a gathering of county, Provincial, Overseas and educational bodies overseeing Camogie. We held a Special Congress on 22nd May to consider a new Constitution.

We used E-voting for the first time to vote on the Constitution. The experiment was a great success with nearly 98% of recommendations passed. Rules governing suspensions were referred to Ard Chomhairle after a 50:50 split. Some of the motions will come into effect on 22nd June (one month after Congress) while others will be effective from 2011. Some of the changes include:

 Amending our name from Cumann Camógaíochta na nGael to Cumann Camógaíochta or the Carnogie Association (from June 2010)

Agreeing to liaise and co-operate with other Gaelic Games bodies (from June 2010)

 Adopting age bands for under age Camogie including that players must be over 15 for adult club Camogie and over 16 for inter county adult competition (from 2011)

 Adopting child centred, small sided games that focus on skills development for all under 12 games activities (from 2011).

Proposals to introduce (in 2011) match bans as suspensions instead of time bans resulted in a

50:50 vote and Central Council will now consider this further. It was a very successful day - 45 proposals considered and 43 passed with strong consensus. More

details on the rules will be on the website shortly. People enquire about how to amend the playing rules. These are considered every three years with 2012 Annual Congress the next opportunity.

New transfer rulings to impact on all the clubs

Rules changes

A LOT of changes will come into effect in the coming months with the Special Congress which was held recently bringing in rules which will impact on all members of the association.

Last week we focused on Go Games and this week we look a major rule bange which will evoke much discussion at local level, governing transfers, something which is always huge on the agenda at convention every year as more and more players seek to move around. The change now sees a rule introduced designating the club with which a player first legally participates in club competition as a player's home club. This will be taken into consideration if a player wishes to change clubs and transfer.

Under the old system, if a club granted and signed a transfer, a player was free to move clubs to her new club. Now a new committee must be set up by all county boards which will legislate for transfers, hearing and disciplinary issues and in all instances if they feel a transfer should not be granted it will be refused. The main changes with players applying for transfers will be as follows:

 A player wishing to transfer must complete the relevant transfer form and must now specify her reasons for the transfer request. She must then give the transfer form to her club secretary thereby putting the club on notice of her intention to apply to the county board for permission to transfer.

2010

 If sanctioned by the club, the form is then passed to the transfer hearing and disciplinary committee who will still have the final say on whether the transfer is sanctioned or rejected.

 If rejected, the player must be given the reasons why.

 Transfer requests may be rejected on one of the following grounds: If a player or a player's family are not

resident within the area of the club to which she wishes to transfer to. Where a county board has reason-

able evidence that a player has been approached by the club she wishes to transfer to. Where the relevant transfer hearing

and disciplinary committee has adjudged that the receiving club has sufficient playing members. Where they adjudge that her current

club would be negatively affected by the

Where they adjudge it would not be in the best interest of camogie.

 On receipt of the transfer request from a player the club executive committee must consider the application within seven days and must either agree to the transfer in which case the secretary signs it and submits it to the county board.

If the clubs do not sign the form it's returned to the player within five days giving the players the reasons for the non-signing. The play may then submit the transfer to the county board secret-

 In all instances, a player who transfer is not granted still has the option of staying two calendar years on the side line after which time they are free to register with the club of their choice.
