

nce or twice while sitting on the Hogan Stand during the camogie All-Ireland final last September, I got this wild urge to rush onto the pitch, hijack a Tipperary uniform and a hurley, and be part of what WE were meant to do 20 years ago. But it was too late, 20 years too late.

Besides, they were able to do it them-

Could it be two decades since we played with the Tipperary senior camogie team in an All-Ireland final at Croke Park? Could it be that we lost that one glorious chance, by just a couple of points to Antrim? Now, on the second Sunday of September 1999, the bouncing fit children of our friends and acquaintances (terrifying, isn't it?) were the new generation and it was our place to sit and watch them, helplessly, from the Stand as they played the grandee county of camogie - Kilkenny.

Have kids got no nerves any more? Modern youngsters seem to have this inbuilt confidence that comes with their shiny hair, straight teeth and the expectation that they will never be poor. If I recall the 1979 All-Ireland correctly, lots of us were a mass of pained anxiety in the private sanctuary of the dressing-room before the game. The prospect of facing that legendary scream when the team ran onto the sod did nothing to dull our fever. But 20 years on, the young women of Tipperary are SO ice-cool and apparantly unperturbed. But still not complacent.

Before the game last month, a few of that old 1979 side - my sister Siobhan, Rosie Ryan, Maura Hogan and Ann Gleeson - got together for a pre-match "anniversary" drink in Quinn's pub in Drumcondra. It turned into a rather delayed post-mortem of our own ill-fated efforts as well as a preview of the game we were about to see.

Meanwhile, somewhere else in Dublin, in the Tipperary team hotel, that great veteran of hurling, Donie Nealon - whose daughter Sinead plays at wing back with the county - was giving a piece of solid advice that we could fruitfully have applied 20 years ago. He told the team that there were not there to PLAY an All-Ireland; they were there to WIN an All-Ireland. Therein lay the answer to our failure. We were so pleased to be in the final, we lost sight of winning.

But Donie Nealon's words were reflected in every action, every stroke, every ball that today's senior team hurled later that afternoon. This Tipperary team came to Croke Park confidently and without any nonsensical psychological baggage about not being able to beat Kilkenny. They were unfussed by statistics that did not exactly run in their favour. Kilkenny had 12 All-Ireland titles: Tipperary had none. Kilkenny still had a Downey sister on the panel; Tipperary's names threw up memories of great hurling successes but they were relatively unknown in camogic circles.

Most ominously of all, Tipperary had suffered annihilation at the hands of Cork in the League Final - that humiliating curtain-raiser to Tipperary v Kerry in the first round of this year's Munster hurling championship in Thurles. The most ardent loyalists could be forgiven for suffering flash-backs to that dreadful day and for believing that this camogie team was not destined for good things.

But the players left all that behind them in the trash-can of bad memories. As it happened, perhaps that League final experience was a blessing in disguise. For along came Michael Cleary and Colm Bonnar. They brought with them a rigorous, professional physical training programme that tuned the players. Veterans of All-Ireland finals themselves, they had important insider knowledge of the mental approach needed for victory.

Well, nothing marks off the years like All-Irelands in Croke Park. Just like 20 years before, it was a bright, sunny afternoon. There were some significant changes. however. Now, in the first of the two-year pilot project, the teams were 15-a-side, not just a dozen. They played the entire pitch, instead of the mini-version, making the game much freer and more flowing. Croke Park's architecture had undergone a revolution in the two decades and the crowd was bigger, much bigger, than in 1979. Over 15,000 attended this year's final, three times the crowd that watched us. (This, without doubt, is due to the huge increase in the attention that television is paying to the sport - particularly programmes like the slightly zany Breaking Ball show on Friday nights).

But just being in Croke Park again, hearing the high-decibal shrieks of fervour, made the years peel away. Deirdre Hughes at full forward, Emer McDonnell in the corner, provoked that same sense of delighted anticipation every time they got the ball for Tipperary. Except on this occasion, they fulfilled the expectation. Deirdre Hughes was better than any of the Kilkenny forwards. Ciara Gaynor's leadership was strong. The personality of Maeve Stokes, their captain, concentrated their minds....



Kilkenny's most famous sub, Ann Downey, whose sister Angela has retired from the sport, came on for the last few minutes. Her name was enough in the past to strike fear into the hearts of lesser players. And there were many lesser. Not so now. Tipperary played on, irrespective. If Setanta had arrived on the pitch in a Kilkenny outfit, it would not have caused them to raise an eyebrow.

My aunt Delia used always weep when we won our matches. We used to think that only the elderly cried with happiness. But watching those girls in blue and gold hug each other with such unbridled delight at the end of the last carnogie championship final of the 20th Century unleashed a flock of butterflies in the tummy and a flood of tears to the eyes. We must be getting old.

n Sunday next the semi-finals of the All-Ireland Club Championship are down for decision. The holders Granagh/Balingarry, Limerick host the Leinster Champions St. Lachtan's, Freshford Kilkenny in Ballingarry at

Granagh, four times Munster champions won their first All-Ireland Club Championship title last year when they defeated the then Leinster champions St. Vincents, Dublin by one point in the final 1-9 to 1-

Freshford after reaching the Leinster decider last year came through to win their first Leinster Title by defeating Rathnure, Wexford 1-7 to 0-7.

They field many of the Kilkenny senior team that reached the 'Bord na Gaeilge' All-Ireland senior championship final last September in Margaret Hickey, Sinead Costelloe, Maread Costelloe, Gillian Dillon/Maher, Martina Maher and Mary

Granagh/Ballingarry defeated Cashel, Tipperary 0-12 to 0-4 in the Munster decider where Eileen O'Brien notched off 0-10 of the total. They will field many All-Ireland medal holders from the Limerick team that won the All-Ireland Intermediate Championship in 1996.

They will expect a good performance from Eileen O'Brien, Vera Sheehan, Laura Leslie, Kay Bourke and Jean Cullinane.

Freshford is sure to put up a good display but home venue may give Granagh the edge.

In the other semi-final Davitt's Galway, Connacht Champions for the second time (their first was in 1995) travel to take on fourth time Ulster champions Liatroim/Fontenoys Down. Liatroim won the Ulster crown in 1984, 1995 and 1996 and had a very successful outing at the 'Whirlpool' All-Ireland Sevens in Kilmacud last September when they became the third Ulster club to reach a semi-final of this event in 26 years of participation.

Mairin McAleenan was top scorer with a grand total of seven goals twenty one points in three matches. Mairin will cause major problems for Davitt's defence as will Lisa Quinn, Caitriona McCrickard and Claire McGrath.

In the Ulster Club championship final they defeated Crosserlough, Cavan 2-7 to 3-2. They will be anxious to become the first Down club to reach the All-Ireland final, having failed at the first hurdle to St. Vincent's Dublin last year. They will be hoping to go that step further this year.

Davitt's had a huge win over London Champions Brother Pearses in a quarter final tie. They have a difficult task on hand but have a very experienced side. Many of their team recorded huge tally's in the quarter final: Brendan Daniels 3-2 and All-Ireland Minor medal holders Alva Kelly scored 2-5 and Lourda Kavanagh 1-5 and together with Olivia Broderick, Lisa Fahy, Joanne Frost and Edel Pierce they may

For the opening 30 minutes Liatroim Fontenoys carried the game to their opponents and led by 0-5 to 0-4. Then in first half Injury-time Olivia Broderick fired over a great point and Mary Tracey shot home from a narrow angle to put her side in at the break 1-5 to 0-5 ahead.

When Tracey latched on to a neat pass from Donna Kelly a few minutes later for Davitts' second goal, the game was well out of the Ulster side's reach.

Davitts looked much the better side during the second half and their good tactical awareness in keeping Mairin McAleenan from gaining possession as she had done before the break.



Eircell GAA All Star Player of the Month September 1999 Brian Corcoran

Brian Corcoran gave a memorable display in this year's All-Ireland Hurling Final against Kilkenny. He is now regarded as a father figure in Cork hurling, being an inspiring influence on the youngsters of this year's Cork team.

Brian received his first All-Ireland medal in 1991 for a superb display in Cork's win over Mayo in the All-Ireland minor football final. In 1994, he won an All-Ireland medal with Cork's under 21 football team and this year he won his first All-Ireland senior medal.

Brian has won three Munster senior football medals between 1993-1995, two Munster senior hurling medals in '92 and '99, two National League medals in '93 and '98, a Railway Cup medal in 1995 and an Oireachtas medal in 1998. In 1992 he was named Hurler of the Year and in May 1998 he received his first Eircell Player of the Month award.

Mark O'Reille

Mark is recognised as one of the most reliable and dependable corner backs in gaelic football. He was still in his teens when he won his first All-Ireland medal in 1996.

This year he put in another remarkable performance in Meath's defeat of Cork to give him his second All-Ireland senior football medal.







Camogie marches on

HE establishment of colleges camogie on a structured basis in the late 1960s has been one of the resounding successes of Irish second-level

A continuous flow of players, who have learned to play the game skilfully, have emerged from the sector to supply club and county teams throughout the country.

Competitions are keenly contested, and produce a very high standard. The ability of teachers who coach the game to impart the basics to young players is invaluable.

The All-Ireland Colleges Championship began in 1968 when two exceptional sides Presentation, Kilkenny and St Aloysius, Cork - contested the final.

Within a short time, several of the participants, including Liz Neary, Helena O'Neill and Teresa O'Neill (Kilkenny) and Liz Garvan and Rosie Hennessy (Cork), were household names on the camogic scene and had won All-Ireland senior medals with their counties.

Corn Sceilge, the All-Ireland Colleges Camogie trophy, has toured the country since then. Sacred Heart, Newry carried it to Ulster. Presentation Oranmore and Presentation Athenry underlined the talent in Connacht.

Scoil Mhuire, Cashel; St Aloysius, Cork; St Patrick's, Cork; North Presentation, Cork; St Patrick's, Shannon, and St Mary's, Nenagh, all had the Munster flag flying high.

Dublin schools St John of God, Artane, and Maryfield College, as well as St Brigid's, Callan, and Presentation

Mountmellick, proved Leinster's worth. Two schools stand head and shoulders above the rest in the history of Colleges Camogie, St Raphael's, Loughrea and St Mary's, Charleville have set almost every record that exists. Between 1985 and 1992, St Raphael's were unbeatable in the

All-Ireland Colleges senior championship. As players graduate from school and younger girls fill their places, it is a truly phenomenal feat for a school to retain the

championship for eight successive years. St Raphael's also captured the All-Ireland Colleges junior championship on four occasions, and two All-Ireland Sevens titles.

YRIL FARRELL, the well-known Galway burling coach, moulded these winning combinations and produced top-class exponents of the game, including Imelda Hobbins, Deirdre Costello, Pamela Nevin, Brid Stratford, Olivia Broderick, Clare Lynch and Triona Dolphin.

St Mary's, Charleville made their first appearance on the All-Ireland scene in 1986 All-Ireland titles.

Vincent Harrington and Anne-Marie O'Keeffe are the talented mentors on the sideline, and stars who have rolled off the production line include Helen Cagney. Claire O'Callaghan, Frances Broderick, Sinead O'Callaghan, Vera Sheehan, Laura Leslie and current school captain, Eileen O'Brien.

In the early years of the All-Ireland Championship, titles were won by sides with four or five top-class performers, with players of average ability filling the remaining places.

That is no longer the case. Nowadays, practically every player on an All-Ireland Senior Championship winning team has inter-county experience at some level. This standard is now essential for success.

THE NEW ALL-IRELAND CHAMPIONS FACE THE REST OF IRELAND

unday, November 14th, 1999
was a special occasion in many
respects. It was the first time
ever that a Rest of Ireland selection lined out against the All
Ireland Champions, and for the
first time ever, Tipperary were the Bord
Na Gaeilge All Ireland Champions.

As we well know by now, the Premier County made history by taking the O'Duffy Cup on the first Sunday in September, and therefore were afforded the honour of hosting this prestigious event. The splendid sod of McDonagh Park in Nenagh was the venue where 44 players gave an exhibition of camogie.

players gave an exhibition of carrogue.
21 of these girls, who were picked from the cream of the country's talent, formed a guard of honour as the girls from Tipperary ran out on to the pitch. It was indeed a sight to behold as cameras clicked every-

where to capture the moment.

The Rest of Ireland was selected from all remaining eight senior counties, with centre-back Gillian Maher of Kilkenny playing a captain's part. Marina Downey. Sinead Millea. Miriam Holland and Bridget Mullaly were the other representatives from the Black and Amber. Numerically, Cork made a similar contribution in Cora Keohane, Denise Cronin, Eithne Duggan, Vivienne Harris and Fiona O'Driscoll.


The West was not to be outdone fielding Galway's Pamela Nevin, Olivia Broderick and Veronica Curtin, while the Banner County had Marie Collins and Moira McMahon. It was particularly memorable for Marie, who was also crowned "Player of the Match".

Limerick was much to the forefront with two of their All Ireland Club Championship side, Vera Sheehan and Eileen O'Brien. The stars from the County Down were Mairin McAleenan and Nuala Magee, while Dublin's representation was in the form of Germaine Noonan and Irene Kirwan.

Yes indeed, a star-studded line up; and not forgetting Kate Kelly from Wexford who was forced to withdraw due to other commitments.

Their very likeable captain Meadhbh Stokes, with an array of All Ireland medallists following behind her, led out the All Ireland Champions. Virtually unknown six months ago, household names now jumped out to greet us. Una O'Dwyer, then Ciara Gaynor. Sinead Nealon, Angela McDermott and Noelle Kennedy close together. Emer McDonnell was there too, but last of all wearing a wide grin was the star herself

The match in Nenagh lived up to all expectations, an exhibition of camogie at its best. Only two points separated the sides at half time, but understandably post-All Ireland celebrations took their toll on the champions, and eventually they were forced to give way to the ladies splendidly clad in green, white and gold.

Ten points separated the sides at the full time whistle of Aine Derham. The score-board was repeatedly photographed, as it historically read Ireland 4-12 Tipperary 2-8. Whirlpool Irl. Ltd. were the main sponsors of the event, and through their generous support ensured a memorable day for all involved.

For many players that day would have brought the curtain down on their camogie season. But not for Galway's Olivia Broderick (a recent winner of the 1999 Galway Bay Player of the Year), and not for Vera Sheehan and Eileen O'Brien from Limerick. These girls will represent their respective clubs in the All Ireland Club Final on November 28th in Tynagh, Loughrea. Defending champions Granagh/Ballingarry will travel north where Davitts will host this year's final, a final that provides an intriguing culmination to the sporting year as both teams are well capable of lifting the honours.

It would be a first for Davitts, but if they did succeed, they would be the fifth Galway club to engrave their name on the Bill Carroll Cup. Oranmore, Athenry, Mullagh and Pearses have all been winners since the competition's inauguration in 1964.

Granagh/Ballingarry are going for back to back success, having won the title for the first time in 1998. In doing so, they added



to the proud tradition already set by Croagh-Kilfinny and Ballyagran in Limerick.

Both semi-finals told contrasting stories. The southerners had a titanic struggle with Freshford of Kilkenny, emerging with just one point to spare, while Davittts enjoyed second half dominance over Down's Liatroim Fontenoys to win by a comfortable margin.

One thing is for sure though, who ever emerges victorious, they will be worthy champions.

Meanwhile, another special occasion was celebrated recently in Dublin City University (DCU), and again it was a first. The University awarded GAA Scholarships to camogie, a scheme that was jointly funded by AIB, DCU, and Comhairle Laighean.

Eimear Brannigan, an Electronic Engineering student, who plays with St. Vincents Carnogie Club and is also a member of the Dublin senior team, was one of the recipients. The second award went west to Galway's Mairead Meehan who is a Business Studies student. The Pearses club player won back to back Minor All Irelands in 1996/1997 with the Maroon and White, and also captained her school, Holy Rosary, Mountbellow to All Ireland Colleges glory.

'ALL-IRELAND WIN A BONUS'

Deirdre Hughes tells Owen McCann

ome-back story of 1999 in Gaelic Games? The distinction must surely go to the Tipperary team that captured the All-Ireland senior camogie title for the first time ever last September.

The prospects of a good run in the championship looked bleak to say the least back in May when Cork trounced Tipperary by a whopping 9-19 to 2-7 in the National Senior League final--and at Thurles.

Yet a mere four months later Tipperary not only lined out at Croke Park in the showpiece game of the year but turned in a first-class display to defeat firm favourites and modern title specialists Kilkenny, who had ousted Cork in their semi-final.

A real fairy tale-like story and as good a come-back as one could find in any year's competitions in Gaelic games.

What brought about the dramatic change in fortune? Deirdre Hughes, Tipperary's full forward and one of the brightest stars of the historic break-through, says that the decision to call in experienced hurlers Colm Bonnar and Michael Cleary after the League final defeat, was a key factor.

"They made a big difference. They gave an added dimension to our play. We became more focussed. We did a lot of ball work and concentrated as well on skills in our training.

"It was also a big help that we won a number of All-Ireland minor titles over the 'Nineties and our team included a strong framework of players with national medals in that grade."

But the gifted forward from Toomevara maintains that the All-Ireland success was still something of a bonus.

"Remember we were only in our second

year in senior ranks and so it was a rapid break-through in that regard."

Deirdre told me that Tipperary were in no way over-awed by Kilkenny's great reputation in the sport.

"We certainly respected Kilkenny, but we went out in the final to produce our best form and show just how well we could play. Things worked out really well for us on the day."

Hughes proved a major influence in ensuring that things worked out "really well" for Tipperary. She had an outstanding game at full forward and highlighted a display of class and skill by scoring three valuable points.

She was in even more sharpshooting form in Tipperary's run-away win over Down at Parnell Park, Dublin, in a semifinal last August. She scored a majestic 4-3 in that game--a personal best in inter-county competitions.

EARLY CELEBRATIONS

Small wonder that Deirdre Hughes was later named Eircell Camogie Player of the Year after her outstanding contributions to Tipperary's year of glory.

The All-Ireland senior medal was an early birthday present for Deirdre, who was 26 just three days after the final.

Hughes lost no time in finding her feet with Tipperary. The past season was her tenth in inter-county competition and she has had important successes. These include All-Ireland medals in 1992 (junior) and 1997 (intermediate). She has also won two junior Gael-Linn (interprovincial championship) souvenirs with Munster.

And, now, of course, her collection includes the game's top medal as well as that Eircell award.

The clever and hard-working forward

has also had a very successful time at local level. So much so that she has a splendid tally of six Tipperary county senior medals.

The All-Ireland senior final last September was the first 15-a-side O'Duffy Cup game. Previously, camogie teams were 12-a-side.

What is Deirdre Hughes view of the 15a-side game?

"After winning an All-Ireland medal in September, I have to admit that the move is a good one. At the start of the year I did not favour the change as it was a new system to adapt to.

"It has resulted in a new game. It's a faster game with more movement and is also more tactical. We are still learning, but I now feel the move to a 15-a-side game is a step in the right direction."

As for the players she has watched or played against, the Tipperary ace left me in no doubt that she is a great admirer of Angela Downey, whom she regards as one of the greatest-ever camogie players.

She also singled out Oliva Broderick (Galway) and her current county team-mate, full back Una O'Dwyer, of Cashel, for special mention.

And almost immediately she followed on by telling me that as far as hurling was concerned, she was a great admirer of Nickey English.

What are the Deirdre Hughes ambitions for the future?

"Well, it would be nice to retain the All-Ireland senior title. The break-through should boost our confidence but we will have to wait and see how we measure up in the title defence."

SPLENDID CONTRIBUTIONS

If Deirdre's display was a real highlight of Tipperary's final win, there were other

bright moments.

Noelle Kennedy scored six vital points, all from frees, and substitute Catriona Hennessy had also good cause for celebration after her splendid contribution during her limited appearance.

In the 58th minute she sent over a point from a '45' to give Tipperary the lead. Sinead Millea equalised for Kilkenny and then two minutes into injury time up popped Hennessy to score the winning point from thirty yards and to the left of the posts.

A score worthy of the special chapter it wrote into the history books!

Meadhbh Stokes led Tipperary in splendid style from right half-back and Ciara Gaynor and Sinead Nealon completed a splendid half-back line.

Cork and Derry provided a wonderful curtain-raiser to the historic senior final when they met for the All-Ireland junior championship.

Derry won the Natioal Junior League title in May for the first time and they made a very spirited effort to complete the double. But the Leesiders had a match-winner in left full forward Rachel Maloney, from Courcey Rovers, whose expert finishing proved a vital factor in the Cork success. She hit a superb nine points, six from frees, to set the scene for Cork's sixth title.

Derry won the title twice, in 1969 and 1978 and each year they beat Cork.

Full forward and captain Mary O'Kane

led Derry in impressive fashion and finished their leading scorer with 1-2.

Paula McAtamney, who scored 1-1, was another Northern star, while Martina Mulholland and Ann O'Loughlin at midfield were others who showed up well for Derry. The defenders all also worked tirelessly throughout.

DRAMATIC GOAL

The most talked about score of the entire All-Ireland senior campaign was the last gasp goal by Sinead Millea that earned Kilkenny an All-Ireland senior semi-final win over defending champions Cork at Parnell Park, Dublin.

The game was coming right to a close and Kilkenny were a point adrift when they were awarded a 60 yards free. Millea stepped up to try for what most expected to be an equalising point but the ball dropped right into the Cork net--and the All-Ireland champions had no time to recover.

The final whistle went immediately afterwards to leave Kilkenny sensational winners by 2-12 to 1-13.

The match was a personal triumph for Sinead Millea. Apart from scoring the match-winning goal she also rifled over nine points to really stamp her personality on the match in a very big way.

But, of course, Deirdre Hughes was the player who captured the scoring spotlight in the semi-finals with that superb 4-3 against Down.

Another player impressively on the scor-

ing target was Una O'Donoghue of Cork. She helped herself to 3-2 as the Rebels had that oh so comfortable win over Tipperary in the National League Senior final back in May.

Right on her heels in that game were her team-mates Sinead O'Callaghan and Fiona O'Driscoll, each of whom scored a splendid 2-4.

It was a good year over-all for camogic and ended on an unusual note with a new addition to the calendar. This brought All-Ireland champions Tipperary up against the Rest of Ireland in novel clash at Neuagh sponsored by Whirlpool.

Afer a keenly contested first half, the Rest, who led at the break by two points, stamped their dominance on the exchanges to run out good winners by 4-12 to 2-8.

Sinead Millea (Kilkenny) had a particularly good game for the winners.

It is not often that a player scores three goals and still finishes on the losing side. That was the contrasting fortunes for full forward Orla Curtin, who completed a great hat-trick for Gabvay in a high scoring All-Ireland minor final at Ardrahan against Cork.

Despite her excellent finishing powers, the Leesiders still came out on top by the minimum margin ~2-12 to 3-8--to retain the title.

Cork also had a sharpshooter in left half forward Eimer Dillon, who sent over six points.

ithin months of the formation of the Camogie Association by the Keating Branch of the Gaelic League in Dublin in 1904, Cork had adopted the new game. Fainne an Lae, the first Cork camogie club, was formed in the Blarney Street area of the city. When a second club sprang up in the Blackpool, the way was clear for the start of competition.

Clan Eimear, Cork's third club, came into being in the Lough area. The game was by then established in the city. Regular fixtures drew sizeable crowds to the O'Neill Crowley Grounds at Victoria Cross. The Crawford Cup was contested by the clubs whose players were constantly improving in the skills of the game.

SCHOOLS

dates back to 1912. St. Angela's College, Patrick's Hill, Ursuline Convent, Blackrock, Drishane Convent, Millstreet, Scoil Ite and South Presentation Convent were the first to take up the game. St. Aloysius School joined in 1915. This school dominated the Cork Colleges scene for many years and made a huge contribution to the game. The students of U.C.C. took to the game with great enthusiasm and were instrumental in spreading the game throughout Munster on graduation.

DECLINE

Camogie took a back seat for a number of years as political considerations both inside and outside the country dominated. For a brief period, camogie matches were listed as "illegal assemblies" along with many other types of gatherings. Club camogie continued on a limited scale in Cork and the game spread to many parts of the county including Mallow, Midleton and Youghal.

REVIVAL AND GROWTH

The Tailteann Games in 1928 signalled a camogie revival. It provided welcome competition and publicity. Over the next few years phenomenal growth was seen in Cork with new clubs sprouting up in all parts of the county. Punch & Company presented the Science Cup for the Cork Senior Championship in 1932. The inaugural competition attracted an impressive entry of twenty teams and was claimed by St. Aloysius School.

arena in 1934. A glorious chapter in Cork's history was to follow. In an eight year period Cork won six All Ireland Senior titles and produced some of the finest players ever seen. Josie McGrath, Kitty Buckley, Lil Kirby, Lena Delaney, Maura Cronin and May McCarthy were the stars of Cork's first three in a row.

TOP CLUBS

The game flourished in the thirties and many new clubs affiliated including three, Old Aloysians, Glen Rovers and Lee Hosiery, which were to hold the limelight and supply many outstanding players to Cork. The O'Duffy Cup was back by the Lee in 1939. Some excellent players had come into the side including Peggy Hogg. Kathleen Coughlan, Mary Fitzgerald, Eileen Casey, Renee Fitzgerald, Mary Vallelly and the Hegarty twins. Cork left Galway trailing by five goals in the All-Ireland Final. Peggy Hogg's goalkeeping exploits were the talking point in the successful 1940 campaign. Kitty Buckley led Cork to victory in 1941 and wrote herself into the history books with six goals in the All-Ireland Final.

CORK'S DARKEST HOUR

Allegations of irregularities in the handling of Cork finances lead to a split in Cork camogie. Untold harm was done to the progress of the game in the county. For eight years, Cork did not compete in the Munster or All-Ireland Championships. Club camogie continued but many fine players were deprived of the privilege of wearing the famous red and white colours. On the local scene, some outstanding contests were witnessed between Old Aloysians, Lee Hosiery, Glen Rovers and Imokilly.

RETURN TO ACTION

Siobhan O'Brien (Glen Rovers) led Cork back onto the playing fields in 1952. For the next decade or so, Cork shared provincial honours with Tipperary. But the winning habit was lost. Twenty-seven years elapsed between the 1941 All-Ireland success and the return of the CORK 2000

GLORY DAYS AGAIN

A new generation of camogic players, well prepared and highly motivated by coach, Jack Dempsey, bridged the gap. This outstanding group of girls won four All Ireland Senior titles from 1970 to 1973. Me Cummins, Marie Costine, Liz Garvan, Pat Moloney, Betty Sugrue, Anne Comerford, Hannah Dineen, Rosie Hennessy, Marion Sweeney and Marion McCarthy were superb exponents of the game.

WINNING HABIT SPREADS

Nancy O'Driscoll captained the Cork Junior side to ultimate success in 1973. The Minors brought Corn Tailteann to Cork in 1975. Jacinta O'Brien skippered St. Aloysius School to victory in the All-Ireland Colleges Senior Championship. North Presentation Convent and St. Patrick's were soon to follow suit. The winning habit grew. Cork doubles and trebles were the order of the day.

GRAND SLAM

1980 was the season when dreams became reality. Cork swept the boards at Munster and All-Ireland levels. All-Ireland senior, junior and minor titles were claimed. Killeagh brought the All-Ireland Club Championship title to Cork for the first time. Cork supplied the lion's share of the Munster teams that commandeered the inter-provincial titles and Marion McCarthy, Clare Cronin, Ann Marie Landers and Mary Geaney were honoured with the National Player of the Year awards. Mary O'Leary, Cathy Landers, Clare Cronin, Martha Kearney and Eileen Dineen were instrumental in bringing another brace of senior titles in 1982 and 1983. The Cork Juniors went all the way in 1983 and 1984 and the Minors claimed a hattrick of All Ireland titles from 1983 to 1985.

WELL DRIES UP

An invincible Kilkenny side put an end to Cork's gallop in the senior grade for seven long years. The production line of talented minors faltered. On the local scene Glen Rovers blossomed and acquired the first of their four All-Ireland Club Championship titles in 1984. A trip to New York in 1990 did much to lift the spirits of the Cork senior squad.

REBEL RESURGENCE

A new generation of players that included Sandie Fitzgibbon, Linda Mellerick, Breda Kenny, Liz Towler, Lynn Dunlea, Denise Cronin, Fiona O'Driscoll, Eithne Duggan, Vivienne Harris, Mary O'Connor, Irene O'Keeffe and Kathleen Costine put the smile back on the faces of Cork supporters. The O'Duffy Cup was carried aloft down Patrick Street on five occasions from 1992 to 1999.

Tremendous work in less traditional areas improved standards and threw up new players with great potential. Barryroe, Courcey Rovers, Newtownshandrum, Valley Rovers, Ballygarvan and most recently Milford have made a huge contribution. Not surprisingly Cork juniors and minors returned to the winners enclosure. The Senior B Championship allowed clubs regroup and return to the premier grade stronger and refreshed. Bishopstown benefited most and claimed the Science Cup.

Off the field, Cork played a major role in the development of the Association. Five Cork ladies were honoured with the Presidency of the Camogie Association - Lil Crowley (Kirby), Sheila Horgan, Lil O'Neill (O'Grady), Mary Moran and Mary O'Callaghan. On the local scene Cork have been fortunate with the calibre of its officers. Ide Bean Ui She, Alice Quigley, Noreen Murphy, Siobhan O'Sullivan, Mary Crowley, Sheila Golden, Mary Nott, Rose Malone, Miriam Higgins, Nora Newman, Joan Morley and Mary Newman McCarthy are among those who made a big impression.

Schools camogie has always been strong in Cork. Many players had their skills fine tuned in the Cork Schools Championship. St. Aloysius School dominated the scene for over fifty years and were the first Cork school to bring home the All-Ireland Colleges Championship title. North Presentation Convent and St. Patrick's Secondary School also brought Corn Sceilge to Leeside. In the past decade, St. Mary's, Charleville have donned the mantle of the top camogie school in the country.

With over fifty clubs in the county, Cork is presently in a very strong position. Long may it continue into the next century.

s the curtain comes down on the century Cork Camogie continues to grow and expand. Every where new clubs have spring up and going from strength to strength whilst the old established clubs continue to promote and foster the game. With fifty three clubs registered Cork field Inter county teams in three grades, Senior, Junior, and Intermediate whilst at Munster level a second Intermediate team is also fielded. Under age competitions at Under 16 and 18 are where the county groom and prepare the players for the adult competitions.

Intercounty Scene: Minor:

Having taken the All-Ireland title in '98 it was felt that an impossible task faced the minor sides in '99. But John Cronin and Kathleen Healy joined this year by John Quinn the representative from County champions Courcey Rovers had other ideas.

With eight of the previous year's panel still underage a solid foundation existed. Opening their Munster campaign Cork easily accounted for Limerick going on to take the Munster title over a disapointing Clare side. The semi-final was a repeat of last year's final with Derry travelling to Cork, and whilst victorious many felt that to defeat Galway, Cork needed to improve on their display.

On a wet miserable Sunday in August the minor's set the trend for what was to be a memorable feast of Gaelic games for Cork supporters and set in motion a train of success to be quickly followed by the County Junior camogie and Senior Hurling teams in bringing a unique treble of titles Leeside.

Giving a breathtaking display of camogie both teams served up what was for me the best camogie game of the year. The appaling weather conditions did little to hamper the skills and both counties can be proud of the displays. Cork's tremendous achievement taking minor titles back to back agurs well for the future. Following on a superb display Emer Dillon was chosen as Player of the Match and presented with Belleck China.

Captain Niamh Bowles and her team mates made history by becoming the first team to win an All-Ireland title in any grade at fifteen a side, they also set another record when taking the Munster title becoming the first Cork side at any grade to win a title at fifteen a side.

Junior Team

Having lost out in the league final in '98 the Juniors started '99 with only one thing in mind to reach Croke Park and take the All-Ireland title. Again the junior selectors like their senior counterparts introduced many of the victorious '98 minor squad to their panel and how well the girls fitted into a panel that by September had become a closely knit family. ORK 2000

In what was one of the best junior finals in many years the Cork and Derry girls served up a cracker. With Derry cap-tain Mary O Kane and Cork's Orla O Sullivan swopping goals inside two minutes of each other in the first half the sides were deadlocked 1-5 apice at the interval. Ten minutes into the second half a second Derry goal gave the League Champions the lead but responding magnificently the Cork girls showed just how much they wanted this title. Rachel Maloney's accuracy from frees had Cork on level terms with fifteen minutes on the clock remaining, the Cork girls, with keeper Ger Casey making two great saves, scored the winner with seven minutes to go and held on to take the title last won in 1996. An estatic Helen Walsh accepted the New Ireland Trophy, the last junior title of the decade from Uachtaran Phillis Breslin to the delight of her team mates. To crown a wonderful day. Ger Casey was named the player of the match.

The spirit and determination of this Junior side was reflected no more so than by corner back Muireann Harrington who immediately after the game left the field to be admitted to Hospital in Cork for a throat operation. Well done to a wonderful team who thoroughly deserved to be crowned All-Ireland Champions, and to coach Pat Murray and selectors Kay Dunne, Lilian Zinkant and Mairead O Callaghan.

Senior:

The first fifteen a side game drew a big and curious crown to Nemo Rangers pitch in Trabeg on a cold February afternoon when Cork met Tipperary in the opening round of the National League. With the players struggling to come to terms with the extra space and three more players on the team an entertaining afternoon ensued. Cork mastered the new format taking the points and winning all their games to qualify for a league final where they again met Tipperary.

their first league final had no answer to a strong Cork side who took the title in a one sided contest and in the process set themselves up as firm favourites to make it three in a row of All-Ireland titles.

Finding little trouble in their opening championship games a semi-final with Kilkenny who had defeated last year's finalists Galway awaited Cork.

Played as part of a double header the semi-finals at Parnell Park were totally contrasting. The opening game was without doubt one of the finest exhibitions of fifteen a side camogie seen through the year and the only pity was that the sides did not meet in a final such was the fare served up.

Whilst going in as favourites Cork failed to shake off a tenacious Kilkenny side but showing determination led by five points with time almost up. A Margaret Comerford goal cut the deficit and with their backs to the wall Cork fought to hang on. As Sinead Millea stepped up to hit a free fifty five yards from the Cork goal four minutes into injury time the large crowd were pencilling in a replay date for the following Saturday but much to everybody's amazement Sinead's attempted point ended up in the net and with it came the full time whistle.

Whilst losing their title and failing to do the three in a row the Senior side can look forward to a new millennium with confidence. The inclusion during the season of younger players such as Sarah Hayes and Una O Donoghue has been a very positive move by the selectors and with the continued success of the junior and minor sides we are sure to have many more new faces as Cork set out on the road to win the first title of the new century.

Interprovincial

Munster recorded another famous victory taking the senior title, whilst Fiona O Driscoll was honoured by Schwarkpoff with her selection as player of the Gael Linn interprovencial senior games, in the process a cheque for £1000 was presented to Fiona's club Fr. O'Neills.

Club Round Up:

The senior championship saw the lively Carrigdhoun going so agonisingly close to county champions Bishopstown in their opening round game and Cloughduv almost causing an upset against Fr. O'Neills in the semi-final.

However the final again threw county champions Bishopstown and Fr. O'Neill's together for the third year in a row. Anticipation was high amongst the East Cork side that this was to be their year. A Ciara Healy goal mid way through the opening half was to be the score that separated the sides at the final whistle and gave Bishopstown their third county title in a row.

In Munster Bishopstown had a huge victory over Waterford side Butlerstown

before taking on All-Ireland club champions Grenagh Ballingarry in the semi-final. Leading 2-9 to 0-8 with eight minutes remaining the Bishopstown girls were hit with a four goal blitz from Eileen O Brien and Vera Sheehan and lost out on a 4-10 to 2-9 scoreline.

At the time of writing only the senior county championship has been completed with the other competitions drawing to their concluding stages.

Under age competitions again were the highlight of the year with Ballyhea taking the club's first camogie title with their

Watergrashll and St Catherines did battle for C3 honours with the Hill girls coming out on top. DC1 saw Ovens with Margaret O Herlihy and Aoife Mc Carthy in tremendous form defeat Bun Scoil Youghal. So to DC 2 where a strong Coachford side over powered a spirited Ballinaspittal, DC 3 saw Ballygarvan with two Ashling O Riordan goals and one from Clare Bouse take the title over Belgooly. . Dungourney defeated Goggins Hill in the DC 4 and so to the final game of the competition the DC 5 final where Berrings with Margaret Cosgrave notching up four goals for her side ran out winners over Cloughduv.



Mash is no relation. He certainly wasn't even on my wavelength one morning last January when he regaled me with the song, "I can see clearly now the rain has gone." The rain hadn't gone. It had persisted for weeks and as for "seeing clearly" I was in the dark about where or when our Munster Senior Camogie semifinal against St. Josephs Tulla could be played. Many phone calls and much begging later a venue is found.

Can we get to the Munster Final! We have our problems. No school pitch and all local pitches closed being one major one. The school tennis courts would have to do for training. We had to resort to them for the earlier rounds during a wet October.

Obviously not ideal but it was sufficient to see us past Borrisokane and Fethard. It seems such a long time back to those October days. Those days when fear of failure is a real factor. It afflicts all teams starting a championship. Those days when you wonder have you the right blend. In colleges terms it's the month of doubts.

Tulla are formidable. We have had stirring games with them in recent years. We play well on the day, dare I think it - certainly can't verbalise it - but we played superbly. We are in the Munster Final.

After encountering "foreign" opposition throughout who do we find ourselves against in the final - neighbours and friends, St. Mary's, Macroom. The exhiliration of the Open Draw! Thoughts for another day perhaps! For now its trying to cope with the baggage this type of game carries. Peripheral issues - local club / community rivalry, illogical expectations of supporters, tend to obscure the central issues in the lead up to these games, we actually cope well with the pre-match hysteria. On the field we also cope well and a goal ten minutes from time to put us seven points ahead had us, "Living on easy street".

Again the junior selectors, like their senior counterparts, introduced many of the victorious '98 minor squad to their panel and it worked well. Under the guid-ance of selector Lilian Zinkant, the team reached the national league semi-final but minus players tied by exams had to give way to a Derry side that later in the year were to provide the opposition in Croke Park.

The Munster championship threw up a date with champions Tipperary and with a superb display against the wind in the second half the champions were dethroned.

Only Offaly now stood in the way of the young Cork side achieving their goal of reaching Croke Park. After a ding dong battle a late rally yielding five points without reply from Rachel Moloney in the closing minutes had Cork in the final. Pat Murray had his charges ready and able for what was one of the best junior finals in many years as the Cork and Derry girls served up a cracker. Helen Walsh accepted the New Ireland trophy, the last junior title of the decade from Uachtairan Phillis Breslin to the delight of her team mates.
