A PROBLEM that has existed in camogie for many years is the very slow turnover of players on the senior county team. This meant that there was no room at the top for many up and coming young players.

But one place that will definitely be vacant next year is that of Helena O'Neill. For after considering retiring for some years, Helena has decided to take the plunge after this year's successful campaign.

"I wanted to retire last year but I was persuaded to come back for another year. And naturally I'm delighted that I did as it's



great to go out on a winning note," she said.

"It's the ideal time now for me to bow out. I'd hate to hang on and make a show of myself next year".

Helena has had a very impressive career. She began playing camogie stitches. when she started her secondary level education games were when she at the Presentation Convent, Kilkenny where a tradition of playing the game was slowly being built up, beginning with such students as Mary niest incident that ever Fennelly.

Her first game was a humble school seven-aside which was played in the Fair Green. Here she got her first bitter taste of defeat.

joined in and played in goal.

Like many Presentation players, Helena joined St Paul's camogie club when she was sixteen. Her team. mates included such other stars as Liz Neary, Bridge Martin, Carmel Doyle and of course little sister. Teresa.

She was recruited almost immediately to ioin the county team, " was really thrilled when I was selected to play for Kilkenny. I could not believe that I was playing on the same team as all the other players that I really admired. It made me feel that I was one of the best".

And during her 11 years playing for Kilkenny, she has justified her place on the team by helping them to win four all-Irelands, two National Leagues, and four Leinster championships. Her only injury through all these years was a facial injury which merited three

PEGGY PACKS ITIN

THE OLDEST member of the senior camogie team, Peggy Muldowney had firmly decided at the start of this year's campaign to make it her last.

And although she played extremely well and earned her fourth all Ireland medal, she is sticking to her decision to quit.

"It's better to go out at the top than on the way back down. I'm playing long enough now and there's plenty of young ones to take my place. After fifteen years playing, it's almost a case of going before I'm told to go'

on to a position because of my former fitness and skill. Selectors might feel that they would have to include me on the panel and I'd hate to get my place on the team through sympathy".

Like many camogie players, Peggy's interest in the game sprung from hurling with the lads in her native Gowran when she was a young girls. She was also strongly influenced by her uncle Paddy Phelan, who was a good hurler himself.

When she went to secondary school in Goresbridge, she began playing the game proper and her first match was

SENIOR Camogie players should be prepared to put something back into the game by means of coaching or managing, the Munster Council Annual Convention was told in Cork yesterday.

Outgoing Chairman Miss Carrie Clancy (Limerick) said it was not good enough for these players just to play at inter county level without offering their services after retiring.

During the course of her address she referred to the situation in Kerry, where there are many enthusiastic young players wishing to play the game but cannot do so on account of the lack of people at an organisational level.

National President Mary Moran also spoke on this topic during her address to convention. She added that there should not be too much emphasis on inter county playing numbers.

The problem relating to shortages of referees in all counties was mentioned during Miss Eithne Neville's report. Acting as Secretary she said that some counties were experiencing great difficulty, particularly in Cork.

She paid tribute to Clare's All-Ireland Junior success, after being so long in the wilderness. "The fact that 10 of that successful side are members of school teams shows how important it is for counties to nurture the game in schools", added Miss. Neville.

MAINLY FOR WOMEN NANCY O'DRISCOLL

NANCY O'DRISCOLL is a quiet, hardworking solicitor in Cork. She is modest about her outstanding achievements in sport and many of her clients are probably unaware that she has three All-Ireland medals to her credit. When I went to interview her for 'The African Missionary' she recalled selling our magazine when she was at National School.

A.M. Do you come from a sporting family? Nancy. The whole family were interested in all kinds of sport. My three brothers play hurling and football. We are six girls in the family, all camogie players. Three of us - Noelle, Eileen and myself have played for Cork. Mary, who worked with the SMA Fathers in Northern Nigeria, played for U.C.C.

When did you start playing? I come from Kilcrea and when I was about fourteen the Eire Og camogie was formed in the parish. I began playing with the club. I attended school at The Ursuline Convent where I played hockey and tennis as they had no camogie, but they have started it since then.

Tell us about your career on the county team. I got on to Cork Juniors in 1972. I was captain of the team when we won the All-Ireland Junior Final in 1973. After that I moved to the Seniors and was captain when we won in 1978. We also won in 1980. So I have three All-Ireland medals, one junior and two senior.

What position do you play?

I started with the forwards. Now I play mostly centre field but I am growing out of centre field and am retreating to the back line.

Does your club have a strenuous training pro-

We do. We have a very dedicated trainer, Con Malone. With him we have won under-age, junior, intermediate and senior championships. We were the first country club to win the senior championship.

How can the game be promoted among young

The youth themselves should have a love for the game. You don't have to have great facilities. I don't think the emphasis should be on facilities. All that is needed is a bit of green grass, a few hurleys and a ball.

What do you think of the coverage given to the game by the media?

Meet a girl who plays Camogie, Hockey, Soccer and Road Bowling

and hurling. It deserves more coverage and a lot of people want to see it on T.V. The excuse given by the media is that there is not sufficient interest. I think that is wrong. Since I started, the game has greatly improved at playing and

You play hockey as well. Would you prefer

No, I wouldn't put one above the other. I play

the two and I love them both. Does a camogie player have the same social

life as a girl involved in another sport? Definitely. Most teams have a panel of fifteen or sixteen. Every time you play you meet at least thirty people. It is played at all levels club, county and provincial. As a result of camogie I could have friends in Limerick, Antrim, Dublin and Kilkenny, meeting them on a regular basis. And you get to know people from every part of your own county.

What do you think of the growth of Gaelic foot-

If players give the time to any sport it will ball leagues for women? improve. A lot of girls are interested in it and each year they will bring up their own standard.

Is camogie a dangerous game? No. It is not any more dangerous than hockey.

This year insurance has been introduced to cover any medical or dental fees from injuries. Is a serious effort being made to promote camogie in new areas?

At present there is no one person dedicated to this. If there was it might help. If a new club writes to the County Board an officer will visit them. She will arrange friendly matches if they don't want to enter leagues from the beginning. But the interest must come from the people themselves.

What is the most memorable match in your career?

The year we won the Junior County Championship with the Éire Óg club in 1974. We had lost a number of finals before that. The All-Irelands were great but there was nothing to cap that match.

Who is your favourite sports star?

I don't follow football or hurling but in camogie Marian McCarthy, the Cork goalie, and Marie O'Donovan are very good. At a national level Angela Downey of Kilkenny has great skills and is an extremely fast forward.

Have you any ideas for the place of camogie in the forthcoming Centenary Celebrations of the

In relation to their handling of camogie the G.A.A. are fairly generous with their facilities but they seem to be given as a concession rather than a right. We are not part of the G.A.A. but we play the same game so if they are interested in promoting hurling they should also promote camogie. Coming up to their Centenary they could make a serious effort to promote camogie.

Who started the game?

A Mayoman called Sean O'Duffy started it in Dublin in the early nineteen hundreds. He died last year. Angela Higgins, who plays for Cork, has written a book on camogie.

Have you other pastimes?

I play hockey with Old Ursulines. I also play a little soccer and bit of road-bowling. I read a lot. Would you encourage readers to take up the game?

Definitely! Many girls get bored and I cannot understand why they don't take up some sport. Some are afraid they will be no good but it does not matter because the game is graded into senior, junior, junior 'B', etc., so you will find your own standard.

However, they took some consolation from their victories in the Cork Community Games, for the second time, to which they added the Munster title for the first time.

The club regularly arranges weekend visits away to clubs outside Cork. Two teams make the trip to Dublin annually for the All-Ireland Senior final, where they are hosted by the Kilmore Club, managed by exSt. Finbarr's hurler, Tim Cronin, to whom they express their gratitude. The Kilkenny Pan-Celtic tournament is also part of their annual itinerary, and this year they are hopeful of coming away with the honours.

The club has expressed its gratitude to the local banks, shops and firms, and to the local people, for their support in the various fund-raising ventures over the past few years.

They offer a special word of thanks to the Bishopstown G.A.A. ladies' committee, under the chairperson of Mrs. Maud O'Brien, for their work in organising victory functions on many occasions.

The Bishopstown girls are also strong in other sports as is evidenced by their victory in the 1981 Cork Community Games girls Gaelic competition.

The club runs internal leagues and coaching sessions for its young players, including a special session for primary school girls each Monday afternoon at 4 p.m. in the Bishopstown G.A.A. Grounds.

There can be little doubt but that the future of the club will be bright. Hopes include fielding a team in the senior ranks as well as supplying a number of talented players to the various Cork teams.



On the home scene Oranmore retained the Senior title. Davitts brought off the double when they won both the Junior and Minor titles while Ballygar won the Under-14 Championship.

All-in-all the future looks rosy when one considers the fine talent available at under age level and one can look forward to a bright future at All-Ireland

Camogie is thriving in Donegal Schools



The last decade has seen an explosion in the number of women participating in sport. Almost all recreation activities and games report increased female membership not to mention the now common sight of women joggers and marathon runners. This marvellous interest in sport is strongly reflected in the schools where female students now take part in an exceptionally wide range of recreation

In Donegal the girls have taken a really big interest in camogie. Only ten years ago there was no inter-schools camogie in the county; now nine schools compete against each other and during those ten years Donegal schools have reached ten Ulster Finals and four Ulster Championship Trophies have come to the county.

To find out where this upsurge in interest had its roots one must go to Inishowen and to Scoil Mhuire, Buncrana. They were the first Donegal school ever to affiliate to the Ulster Colleges Council and they had a great start in competition losing the Ulster 1st Year Final narrowly in their first year in competition.

Buncrana's success encouraged other schools to affiliate and the Loreto Schools, Milford and Letterkenny, joined with Buncrana and the Derry school Thornhill college to contest for the Ulster qualifying places the following year. Since then the Seniors and Juniors from Milford have only qualified once for the Ulster play-offs but because of very promising performances during the last two years Milford must be in a challenging position for an Ulster Title soon.

However it is Milford's sister school Letterkenny that has really hit the camogie headlines both locally and nationally. It is worthwhile looking at their record since 1973:

1973/74 Ulster 1st Years Champions. 1975/76 Ulster Junior Champions. 1976/77 Ulster 1st Years Runners-up. 1977/78 Ulster Junior Runners-up, Ulster 1st Years Runners up.

1978/79 Ulster U-14 Champions. 1979/80 Ulster Junior Runners-up. 1980/81 Ulster Junior Champions.

By any standards it has been an impressive performance but significantly so far there has been no breakthrough at Senior level. Twice, 1978 and 1981, goals conceded on the final whistle have prevented a Letterkenny appearance in an Ulster Senior Final; maybe 1982 will see that bogey laid to rest.

The late '1970s' saw Carndonagh Community School enter Colleges camogie competition. In their short time competing they have produced some very fine teams and reached the Ulster Senior 'B' final in 1978 where they lost to Kilkeel. They have very good under-age teams at present and since they will not meet Loreto Letterkenny in the qualifying matches they must have a good chance of getting to the Ulster Final this year. What a day for Donegal if two Donegal schools were to meet in an Ulster Final!

VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS

The last five years have also seen the development of camogie in the Vocational Schools. Raphoe led the way and had the reward for years of endeavour when they qualified for the UlsterSenior quarter-final February. Stranorlar were Junior qualifiers in 1979. Letterkenny participated for two years but now await their new playing pitch and will probably be back in action next year. Buncrana made a very impressive debut this year starting with a 9-0 to 0-0 win over Loreto Letterkenny 1st Year 'B's. The performance of their Juniors in this year's championship is eagerly

ANNE CARROLL

Much of the credit for Loreto Letterkenny's success must go to one of the teachers in the school. Arise Carroll. London born Anne began her playing career with Cuffesgrange in Kilkenny. She then moved to St. Patrick's, Tipperary and then to St. Pau's Kilkenny with whom she spent most of her Carnogie career. Her list of honours underlines the fact that she was one of Ireland's greatest camogie players - two All Ireland medals with Kilkenny (1974, 1976): five All-Ireland club medals (1965, 1966, 1968, 1969, 1975); five Gael Linn championships (captaining Leinster in 1971); four Ashbourne Cup medals with U.C.D.: Munster and Lenster Club Championship medals; Leinster Colleges medals and so on.

ALL-IRELAND?

These are indeed exciting camogie times for the schools but one must ask the question will a Donegal school ever bring an All-Ireland title to the County or in other words are Donegal good in Ulster but weak in All-Ireland terms? Letterkenny Juniors have twice been in All Irelands semi-finals. On both occasions they lost to the eventual All Ireland Champions; in 1976 the deficit was 0-0 to 4-0 to Athenry of Galway and last February it was 1-1 to 2-5 to Kilmore of Dublin. In both cases the score reflected the play but the experience gained was immeasurable. Loreto have also been gathering valuable experience playing against the outstanding teams in the country in tournaments like Feile na nGael and Pan Celtic Games as well as travelling all round Ireland for friendlies. During recent years it has become apparent that the Donegal girls are as good as most but lack confidence and belief in themselves against the really strong teams. It only requires this barrier to be broken for a Donegal team to get to Croke Park.

However camcgie is not all about getting to Croke Park - its about twenty four girls really enjoying themselves for fifty minutes on a Saturday afternoon. These school games are always played in a splendid spirit, thanks to the marvellous work of the teachers, and long may this continue.



THE Annual Congress, at the end of March, will elect a new President, Miss Mary Moran, Cork, will have completed a very fruitful term of office in which she travelled the length and breadth of the country to games, coaching courses and meetings.

The biggest change in dates is the moving of the All-Ireland Final



from the second Sunday of September to the fourth Sunday, Many feel this new date is more suitable and may help to attract a bigger attendance. We seemed to be losing out by being sandwiched in between the Hurling and Football Finals.

The Junior and Senior League Finals are arranged for May 30. It will be interesting to see how the new set-up for the Junior League works out. Heretofore the Junior League was confined to junior counties but a motion passed at Congress '81 opened it up to all county junior teams.

Many feel if the new entrants dominate the closing stages of the competition that the Congress decision is open to question.

As usual the minor final is arranged for August but it is brought forward to mid-August.

The Senior Championship (Open Draw) starts on June 20 with the Féile na nGael the following weekend at Dublin.

At time of writing the Ashbourne Cup has been retained for the third year by University College, Dublin and St. Mary's, Belfast have won the College's Championship, Purcell Cup. Four teams remain in the League. St. Mary's, Belfast are at home to University College, Dublin, both Champions in their respective groups.

The other semi-final is a repeat of the Ashbourne semi-final between Queens, Belfast and University College, Cork. The Cork girls won that tie with a goal in the closing minutes so it is anyone's victory this time.

New faces have appeared in the semi-finals of the Post Primary Schools. St. Raphael's, Loughrea rocketed to the limelight in Connacht by winning the Senior and Junior titles for the first time.

Shannon Comprehensive are Munster champions and St. John of God, Kilmore, are Leinster winners, the latter won the Junior All-Ireland title last season when they took over from another Dublin School, Maryfield College, who have won the Leinster Junior title and will play last years finalists, St. Patrick's, Cork, in the semi-final.

Bawnboy, Cavan, are Ulster senior champions for the first time, so their clash with Loughrea will produce a new All-Ireland finalist.

Loreto, Letterkenny, qualified for the second semi-final when they defeated St. Aidan's Cootehill.

Any chance of Kilkenny getting a strong county team going was dashed in 1934 when a bitter dispute over a senior county final — the case of the grey stocking — killed off camogie for over 10 years. (See special

story). 1947 the game was revitalised. Billy Keogh of St. John's club re-organised the Co. Board and Kilkenny entered a team in the Leinster championship where they were beaten by Kildare. A bad beating by Dublin the following year in the same competition dented Kilkenny's ego so much that they again dropped out of the provincial competition for a number of

Although Thomastown beat Castlecomer in the 1952 county final, it was not until '58 that the organisation re-acquired some degree of health. Esther Walsh of Mooncoin chaired the Co. Board in that year and ran a very highstandard county championship.

First success

The following year Kilkenny had their first inter-county success when they beat Laois to take the Leinster junior title. They repeated this in 1960 when the venue for the clash with Laois in the final was Ashgrove, Mooncoin.

National honours came their way through good individual players like Lucy Tobin and Esther Walsh, who played with Leinster, the Gael Linn Cup winning teams in the early '60s.

The year 1960 marked a vatershed for Kilkenny camogie. The Leinster camogie colleges' championship was inaugurated that year and this established the games in schools in Kilkenny, which constituted a reservoir later on of top-class inter-egunty players.

The first school to hit the headlines was the Mercy Con-vent, Callan, who won three Leinster senior schools' titles in '62, '63 and '65.

Kilkenny's Presentation convent soon made its presence feit. The school won Leinster junior titles in '67, '69 and '73 and senior titles in '69 and '70. The Presentation also earned national distinction in '69 when it clinched the first All-Ireland colleges' title and repeated this performance in 1970.

Great-hearted St. Paul's and Kilkenny camogie player for some years, Mary Fennelly is expected to become President of the National Camogie Association at their convention in Wexford on Saturday.

Mary is contesting the presidency with two other can-didates - Mrs. Mary Lynch (Monaghan) and Mrs. Bel O'Loughlin (Down). And although Mary is hotly fancied, her opponents are expected to

offer considerable opposition. Representing Ulster on the Central Council, Mary Lynch (60) trains the Monaghan team and is chairwoman of the Fixtures Committee. She was proposed by the Ulster Council and by councies Monaghan, Kildare, Galway, Antrim and Wicklow.

Mary the voungest

Mother-of-four, O'Loughlin is the present chairwoman of the Ulster Council, and secretary of the Pixtures



Committee. In her early forties, she trains Down and is an intercounty referee, as is Mary Lynch. Mrs. O'Loughlin was proposed by the PostPrimary Schools Council and by Down.

Mary Fennelly is the youngest, and the only single candidate. A former Kilkenny captain, she is secretary of the Leinster Council and a member of the fixtures, administrative, and players' awards committees. She was nominated by the Leinster Council and by counties Meath, Wexford, Limerick, Cork, Westmeath, Dublin and Kilkenny. She is in her early thir-

The number of nominations give little indication of how the voting will go on the day. Some counties may not be able to attend the convention fixed for White's hotel, Wexford, while others who have the right to vote are the members of the Central Council, Provincial Councils and schools and colleges committee. With such a large electoral college, the outcome is unpredictable, though on paper the Kil-

Ambitious

The ambitious Miss Fennelly is anxious to become President and has ear-marked some priority areas if she is successful. A tried and tested administrator, she hopes to attract players into the organisation as she thinks that the feelings at the grass roots are not being represented at the top. She instances her own position. In 1976 she was captain of the All-Ireland winning team, and also had to serve as secretary of Kilkenny Co.

She is concerned about the falling age of inter-county players and reckons that since the game is losing players at a younger age, the Association will have to get players at a younger age in primary schools.

Mary will also be trying to glamourise the Association, and promote its image. And this should be no problem to the naturally elegant Stoneyfordborn woman!

She does not expect a great change of life-style if she is elected president, but her extra work will include chairing Central Council meetings and attending inter-county games and many, many functions.

A hectic year for the new President will be 1984 when the Camogie Association will be represented at numerous functions marking the centenary of
